Hubert Vreeland, State Commissioner of Agriculture, has completed arrangements for the Kentucky Alfalfa and corn special train which will start from Louisville on its swing over the State, on the Knoxville division of the L. & N. railroad from the Broadway and Tenth street station on the morning of September 25 at 8:15 o'clock. The train will comprise a baggage car, day coach, and the private car of President Atilla Cox, of the Henderson route. The itinerary will embrace the two Southern divisions of the L. & N., the L. H. and St. L. and Illinois Central roads. The trip will end October 4.


