The large barn of Alvin Carpenter with about \$1,000.00 worth of hay and corn was burned to the ground soon after being struck. Monday night Arthur Adams lost a fine mare and colt by being struck by lightning. All this was within a radius of 3 miles.

The jury returned a verdict of ten years in the pen against W. M. Mullins, who was on trial in the Laurel Circuit Court at the time of our last issue, for the killing of Luther Manus. The jury got the case Monday afternoon and returned a verdict the Monday morning.

The jury stood for several hours, seven for 21 years, three for 2 years and two for 10 years. A new trial will be asked for. Jeff Johnson, who was with Mullins and under indictment will have his trial this court.
