From the South.

As your readers may be interested in knowing something of the social and political condition of this section, I give in this letter my impression of these. Here the negro population exceeds the white in numbers, slightly, but in the swamps it is two to one. After more than twenty years of freedom, during ten of which these creatures had possession of the State Government and Treasury, they are more degraded, morally and mentally, now than when they feared the lash of the master. While many can read and write, and some have gone higher, in literary attainments, yet their mental power seems not improved thereby, but their capabilities are turned into channels of chicanery and rascality, so that it has passed into a proverb here, "The better educated, the greater the rascal." Their religion, (and they are very religious,) seems to be a mixture of Voodooism, Spiritualism and Methodism, with an interstratum of Campbellism, so far as dipping goes, that is wonderful to behold. As Methodists they shout and groan most lugubriously; as Spiritualists they glide easily into the trance state, which they make the most startling revelations from the spirit world. Their superstition is intense, and one can hear of haunts, ghosts and witches, by verily dropping one their diabolical spells. As dippers, they out Herod Herod; and I am informed that one whole community will vote for St. John from the conviction that he is a son of St. John, the Baptist. Financially they are melancholy failures, being so poor that some die in winter from sheer want of needful food and raiment. It would be a Godsend if the whole race were wrought from existence, since they are now an almost unendurable nuisance to the white race, and in the near future must be removed or the country surrendered to their exclusive possession. Their brutal, lustful nature is constantly breaking out in acts of the most atrocious depravity, and these are becoming so common, that the query "What are we to do?" is heard on every hand. Now that the fear of Federal bayonets has banished the use of the only argument on a level with a negro's comprehension; a good hickory, there is no restraint that can meet the exigencies of the case. The labor system is also in a state of almost hopeless confusion. No contract, written or unwritten, can hold the dejected wretches. I have just
