Articles of Incorporation.

Be it known by these presents, That we, David Steton, Thos. F. Rason, Wm. N. Richards, O. W. Rason, D. B. North and D. C. Flood, of and for ourselves, associates and successors, hereby adopt these articles of incorporation under Chapter 56 of the General Statutes of Kentucky.

Sec. 1. The name of this corporation shall be The Bath Lick and Moore's Ferry Turnpike Road Company, and by that name shall be sued, make contracts, sue and transfer property, and do all acts necessary or incidental in the business of the corporation.

Sec. 2. The principal place of business of the Corporation shall be Owingsville, Bath county, Ky.

Sec. 3. The general nature of the business of this Corporation shall be the building, maintaining, operating and collecting tolls thereon of a Turnpike, McAdam and Gravel Road.

Sec. 4. The authorized capital stock of this Corporation shall be divided into shares of Twenty-five Dollars each, to be issued upon the payment of the purchase money to have the force and effect of a judgment bearing legal interest from the day of sale, with a lien reserved upon said property until all the purchase money is paid; Feb. 10th, 1892.
