Clay City in The List.

The 25 per cent. flat advance in fire insurance rates on frame store-buildings, merchandise stocks and special hazards recently decided on in New York went into effect in Louisville and Kentucky generally March 17. An order to this effect was decided on Tuesday of last week at a secret meeting of the Governing Committee of the Western Union, in whose territory Kentucky lies. At a previous meeting of this committee it was decided to leave the question of the advance to a bulletin ballot of the members of the union. At Tuesday's meeting this ballot was formally canvassed and it was found that the requisite 90 per cent., had voted in favor of the advance.—Louisville Times.
