A special from Lexington says: The mystery surrounding the purchase of some \$200,000 worth of real estate in the east end of Lexington by George Shanklin has been solved. It is announced to-night that the Lexington and Eastern railroad has secured the property for a freight depot and for factory sites.

Gone North.

Gov. Davis, of Arkansas, has pardoned a negro convicted of assault with intent to kill. The pardon is on condition that the negro take up his residence in Massachusetts. The Governor says he is moved to this action by the expressions of sympathy for the "poor oppressed negro" which he heard in the North on a recent visit.

Begin Laying Track.

The work of the L. & A. extension has now reached the point where they will begin to lay the track. This work is expected to begin today and it now looks like the completion of this road as originally planned some ten or twelve years ago will be effected. A survey of a branch road is also being made. This branch is about thirty miles in length and is intended to reach vast coal and timber fields. When completed this road will have along its route some of the largest and richest coal fields in Kentucky.—Register.

E. C. Tully, Thomas Bromback, F. B. Green and Fred Southers, of Grant county, went over into Pendleton county to seine in the Licking river. They were arrested and held to the grand jury in the sum of \$50 each.

Madison County Stock Yards reported about 720 cattle on market, selling from 3 to 5 1/2 cents. Stockers 500-700 lbs. 3 1/2 to 4 cents. Very few fat cattle on market. There were about 200 sheep at the yards which were unsold.—Register.
