The End in Sight.

The Joint Conference Committee of the two Houses of the Legislature have agreed upon a compromise measure which has been reported to the Senate. The report recommends the Wells Bill, selecting the Hunt property as the site for the new capitol, modified by a provision giving the State Capitol Commission the discretion to purchase the additional block desired by the majority in the Senate. The Commission is to have the option to purchase the property at any time before March 1, 1906. The agreement of the committee was unanimous and it is believed the bill will pass both houses promptly, and that an adjournment can be reached soon.
