Killed By Train.

Jerry McIntosh, conductor on the L. E. work train, was run over at Mud Tunnel by his train Friday and a leg cut off. He was put on board the caboose which was alone attached to the engine and hurriedly run into Lexington where the leg was amputated, but the patient died soon after the operation from the shock and excessive loss of blood. Dr. Littlepage accompanied him from this city on to Lexington. He attempted to jump on the train and fell under the moving wheels

with above results. He leaves wife and two children.

J. P. Wright.

Joseph P. Wright is dead, having breathed out his last moments between one and two o'clock Friday, August 11, of cancer and general debility. Burial in the honors of masonry at the old home burial ground near Spout Spring, Saturday, August 12, in the presence of a large number of people.

Deceased was born in Clark county, Ky., July 30, 1820, and was, consequently, 85 years old. Was married, to Martha Ann Todd Sept. 16, 1847. To them were born three children, all of whom are now living. Mrs. Jas. F. McKinney, of Spout Spring, is the oldest child, Elder B. F. Wright, also of Spout Spring, is the older son, and P. A. Wright, of Butler, Mo., the youngest.

December 25, 1896, he was robbed of his wife and most helpful companion, but he married again, this time to Mrs. Nannie Gentry, of Richmond, Ky., a sister to his first wife, and who now mourns his loss. Since his last marriage he has lived in Clay City the greater part of the time.

Mr. Wright united with the Christian church some sixty years ago, and has lived a noble christian life, a life worthy of emulation by all. During all of his life he was pointed out as the model of morals and christianity. Likewise in his younger days he joined the Masonic fraternity, and with much zeal and activity performed the duties of a most worthy Mason. For the last half-dozen years, however, Mr. Wright had been very feeble, and unable to perform the duties of his church membership and order with the same alacrity that he did in younger days, but it was not a waning of his spirit or willingness.

Deceased was also a patriot, having served his country in the capacity of captain during the Rebellion, and there displayed the brave loyal and willing spirit that always so plainly displayed itself whenever the question of duty appeared to him at all epoch of life.

Capitol Contracted for.

The contract for the construction of the new Kentucky capitol has been awarded by the State Commission at Frankfort to the General Supply and Construction Company of New York. The contract price is \$800,000 and a bond of \$225,000 will be executed for the completion of the work within two years from the date the contract is signed. The building is to be of stone from the Bedford, Ind., quarries, with a base of granite.
