L. & E. Reported Sold.

A New York dispatch brings the authoritative news that the Louisville and Nashville Railroad Company has acquired all of the \$500,000 capital stock of the Lexington and Eastern Railway Company, nearly all of the \$1,500,000 general mortgage bonds and \$330,000 deferred debentures, "thereby assuming," according to the announcement made on Saturday, "an issue of first mortgage bonds (\$800,000) which mature during 1911, so that it is expected that within a reasonable short time the property will be entirely clearly of all mortgage obligations."

This New York announcement confirms a story published in the Leader some months ago, to the effect that the Lexington & Eastern railway had passed under the control of the Louisville & Nashville system, although official confirmation could not be secured at the time from the officials of either company.

It has been no secret that the railway extension now being constructed from Jackson, Breathitt county, to Whitesburg, Letcher county, near the Virginia line, is the work of the Louisville & Nashville system, and this was almost conclusive proof that the Lexington & Eastern line, from Lexington to Jackson, had already been acquired by the same interests, which is now authoritatively announced in New York.

The Louisville & Nashville company has been a good customer at the Kentucky railway bargain counter during the last few years, having picked up the old Midland, from Frankfort to Paris, the Louisville & Atlantic, from Versailles to Beattyville, and now the Lexington & Eastern from Lexington to Jackson, all closely interwoven with the

long recognized Louisville & Nashville lines in Central Kentucky, and forming a complete net work of tracks through and around Lexington.

The extension of the Lexington & Eastern railway from Jackson to Whitesburg opens up a tremendous territory in Eastern Kentucky that has been without railway facilities, including the rich coal fields about Hazard, the county seat of Perry county, forty miles from Jackson, all of which country is bound to be tributary to Lexington.—Lexington Leader.
