**SAMUEL PATRICK**  
**Nominated for Represent-**  
**ative.**

The convention to nominate a  
candidate for representative of the  
ninety-second legislative district,  
composed of Breathitt, Lee and  
Magoffin counties, was called to  
order in the court house in Jack-  
son Thursday by Judge W. L.  
May, of Magoffin county, the  
district chairman.

Sam. H. Hurst, of Lee county,  
was elected temporary chairman,  
and J. Wise Hagins, of Breathitt  
county, temporary secretary.

On motion of A. H. Patton, all  
the committees except the Com-  
mittee on Resolutions were dis-  
pensated with.

On motion of A. S. Johnson,  
the chair appointed the following  
a Committee on Resolutions: J.  
P. Adams and Chester Gourley,  
of Lee county; J. B. McLin and  
M. S. Crain, of Breathitt county,  
and W. L. May and Noah Pat-  
rick, of Magoffin county, who re-  
ported the following resolutions  
which were unanimously adopted:  
Resolved, First—That we ap-  
prove of the time and place of  
holding this convention.

Second—We reaffirm our devo-  
tion to the principles of the Re-  
publican party and heartily en-  
dorse the platform adopted by the  
State convention at Louisville,  
and congratulate the people of  
Kentucky on the splendid State  
ticket nominated by the Republi-  
can party.

Third—We condemn the present  
Democratic administration for  
the enactment of oppressive re-  
venue laws, for the reckless expen-  
diture of our public money, for the  
abuse of its pardoning powers,  
for the appointment of partial and  
incompetent special judges to sub-  
serve partisan purposes, for the  
enactment of fraudulent and un-  
fair partisan election laws by  
which the people of Kentucky  
have been deprived of the rights  
of suffrage guaranteed to them  
by the Constitution, and we con-  
demn the unfair primary elections  
and machine politics of the Demo-  
cratic administration by which the  
will of the majority has been  
thwarted and machine candidates  
thrust upon the people.

Resolved—That a copy of these  
resolutions be furnished to The  
Breathitt County News and The  
Beattyville Enterprise.

On motion, the temporary or-  
ganization was made permanent.  
Nominations were then declared  
in order, and on a call of the coun-  
ties A. H. Patton placed the name  
of Samuel Patrick, of Magoffin  
county, before the convention as a  
candidate for representative, in a  
very appropriate speech, which  
nomination was seconded by Noah  
Peters, of Magoffin county, in a  
very eloquent address.

There being no other nomi-  
nations Samuel Patrick was made  
the nominee by acclamation, who  
came forward and accepted the  
honor in a very happy style.  
On motion, the convention ad-  
journed.

**AN ORDINANCE.**

Be it ordained by the Board of  
Trustees of the town of Jackson  
as follows:  
That it shall be unlawful for  
any person to permit cows or cat-  
tle of any kind to run at large in  
the streets of said town, wearing  
bells, after sundown of each day,  
and any person violating this or-  
dinance shall be guilty of a misde-  
meanor and upon conviction be  
fined one (\$1.00) dollar and costs  
for each offense, and each day  
shall constitute a separate offense.

Be it ordained by the Board of
