Bruner at Jackson.

Dr. Ben L. Bruner, Republican nominee for Secretary of State, spoke to a good crowd at the court house here last Saturday. Dr. Bruner has participated in five State campaigns, but says he never saw such enthusiasm as is manifested all over Eastern Kentucky during the present campaign. Citizens of that section, he says, are betting two to one that the Republican ticket will win. For one hour he made a strong appeal to the voters of Breathitt county to stand up manfully in the present campaign in support of the principles of good government, in the upbuilding of the factors that tend to elevate the moral and material status of our Commonwealth and to remove and destroy the forces that make for evil. He reviewed the record of the Democratic party in the management of the affairs of government in Kentucky for the past four years and showed an endless and continuous chain of mismanagement and misgovernment in all the affairs of the Commonwealth. His speech was well received and made a fine impression on the voters present, and his words will be well remembered throughout the heat and turmoil of the impending campaign.

Dr. Bruner made some startling discoveries during his tour which illustrates the wholesale frauds perpetrated by the Democratic machine leaders during the recent primary. Substantial citizens of Martin county, whose veracity is unquestioned, told Dr. Bruner that Martin county did not receive a single ballot for the recent primary. The ballot boxes came all right, but the ballots were short and no election was held. Yet the entire vote of the county was reported for the Beckham-Hager combination. In two precincts of Paintsville, Johnson county, Dr. Bruner was informed that F. A. Hopkins, Democratic candidate for Congress, received 99 votes, which was considered a full Democratic vote, but in the recent Democratic State primary, Beckham and Hager got 392 votes in these same two precincts.

Springs Go To Eubanks.

The Clark circuit court has adjudged W. Z. Eubanks and his children to be the owners of and entitled to the immediate possession of the Oil Springs property, near Indian Fields, that has been in litigation for several years in Clark county. Mr. Eubank expects to improve this property at once, and when that is done it will be a popular summer resort.

Reducing the Grade.

The grade of the Mountain Central railway on the hill near Camp-ton Junction, is being reduced nearly five per cent and will be completed in a few weeks. General Manager John C. M. Day is improving the road in many respects.

Extension of Time.

The Court of Appeals Saturday extended the time sixty days for filing the transcript of the record in the appeal of the Commonwealth vs. James Hargis from Elliott county in the case dismissed by Judge Moody over the protest of the prosecution.

Double Comedy of Errors

Complications even more amusing than those described in Shakespeare's "Comedy of Errors" are possible at the Hotel Condon. Among the guests are Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Caudill and Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Caudill, all of Cannel City, Ky. So much does one Caudill resemble the other man, and so much does each woman resemble the other woman, that frequently they have been mistaken one for another, for the husbands are twin brothers, who married twin sisters, the double wedding occurred at the home of the brides in 1887.

The twin brothers accentuate the likeness existing between them by dressing exactly alike, even to the most insignificant detail, and so do the twin sisters. It is said that when the Caudill twin boys were courting the Wells twin sisters (they began on the same day), each pair privately arranged for distinguishing marks, in order that there might be no embarrassing mistake, but the twin couples laughingly brush aside a query as to the accuracy of this report.

Each of the couples has had three children, but Mr. and Mrs. R. E. have three boys, while Mr. and Mrs. J. T. have two boys and a girl. Why the girl should have happened, and thus marred the continuity of coincidence, is not explained.

"Old Granny" Destroyed

Moonshiners running at large in Lexington were plentiful Sunday night, says the Lexington Herald. Deputy United States Marshal W. M. Mays, the noted foe of the moonshiners in Eastern Kentucky, arrived in Lexington Sunday afternoon from Jackson with a gang of twelve "shiners" to take them to Frankfort, where they will be tried this week in the Federal court, which convenes on Monday. Among the prisoners are Mack Bowler, John Reynolds, P. Barrett, J. Sandlin, Sug Sandlin, Elijah Rich, Elijah Sandlin, Wm. Morris, Eli Couch and a number of others. All of them are charged either with moonshining or bootlegging. Several of the men were captured last week by Marshal Mays in his raids on the moonshine stills in Owsley and Breathitt counties.

One of the best captures he has made during his six years of service for the Government was made last week when he located and destroyed the "Old Granny," at the mouth of Jett's Creek, in Breathitt county. This still has been in operation for ten years, and no marshal or set of revenue men were able to locate it until Marshal Mays found its location. Accompanied by Marshal Frank Elliott, of Louisville, and four other men, they raided the place at night and burned it. Jack Gabbard is believed to have been the operator of the still and a warrant has been issued for his arrest. Warrants have also been issued for the arrests of Elijah Gabbard, Jerry Deaton and Shelby White, charging them with assisting Gabbard in operating the place.

It is one of the oldest stills in Breathitt county. Marshal Mays came near being killed twice in the raid. First he was attacked by a four foot copperhead snake that hung its fangs in his trouser legs, and again his horse fell from a cliff and pitched him to the ground. His leg was very badly bruised in the fall, but in both instances he escaped without serious injury.

One of the reasons why the "Old Granny" still had operated so long without being found was because of the shrewdness of Gabbard. Although the still was in two hundred yards of his home, he had made it a practice to go from his house up a hollow for nearly a mile, cross a creek and then retrace his steps through a creek bottom, so that no path was made leading to the still. The only way that Marshal Mays was able to locate it was through a confederate of Gabbard, who betrayed him. He did not catch Gabbard.
