Inverness.

There is an uncanny, semi-barbaric element in the Scottish history, with its warring clans and violent romances, that half fascinates, half repels.

In 1161 Shaw, second son of Duncan, fifth Earl of Fife, for his assistance to Malcolm in quelling a revolt, was made hereditary governor of the castle of Inverness.

In 1538 the first Protestant minister was appointed, and in 1640 a woman, one Margaret Cowie, a Morayshire woman, started a school.

In 1672 the great fortress was destroyed by the English soldiery. In 1665 a serious quarrel was induced by that calm but indigestible article—the cheese.

The night before the battle of Culloden, Prince Charlie slept in the town-house of Lady Dummur, and the next night, after the downfall of the Stuarts' cause, the same bed was occupied by the "Royal Butcher" Cumberland.

In April, 1746, one of Prince Charlie's soldiers went to a minister, named Thompson, and demanded that he should pray for the Pretender as the lawful sovereign.

"We'll have our horses in your church next Sunday!" said the soldier. "And we'll have them out in time for the litany the Sunday following," said the imperious preacher.

On the 14th of April the horses were stabled in the church. On the 16th the battle of Culloden was fought. On the 21st the minister had his church, and the horses had—departed.

In 1745 two sisters were tortured and burnt in Inverness as witches.

The Royal Academy was opened in 1792.

There was a certain stone called the clachina caplain, signifying the stone of the tubs (it being the place where formerly water-carriers had rested their burdens), and was regarded by the people with great veneration.

In 1834 the chances and changes of time had destroyed nearly all the landmarks of Old Inverness.

Prejudice Against Actors.

"The old prejudice against the stage and against actors still exists to a very great degree," said an actor who arrived in this city from his season's tour the other day. "I have met it this winter everywhere I have been. Whenever our company went to a new city or town we were stared at as though we were a crowd of curiosities from a dime museum, and the contemptuous tone in which people often referred to us as 'actors' so loud that we could overhear what they said, was far from pleasant. Our profession has been disgraced by the conduct of members of cheap companies, whose rowdiness has been regarded as typical of all their kind. Often after we have spent several days at a good hotel the manager has expressed to us his surprise and gratitude at our good behavior, and has been quite taken aback when we have not shown a very profound appreciation of his compliments.

"A hotel-keeper in Toledo said to me one occasion: 'I don't mind telling you, now that you shown yourself a gentleman, that I was very unwilling to admit you into my house, for I would rather have any class of people as my guests than actors. The manner in which the members of some companies have acted at my house has been disgraceful; they have not only behaved and acted badly towards at all hours of the night, but they departed without paying either for the damage done by them to my furniture or for their board.'

"Of course, the number of ill-behaved actors in comparison with the whole profession is small, but they are able to bring discredit on the whole profession. It is strange to note the discredit that even the scene-shifters and other workman about the theater have for us. Many of these hold an actor in great contempt. Why this is, I don't know. Of acting as an art, they have no conception whatever. They regard it solely as a business, and a pretty poor one at that.
