

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SWAMPED!

Struck By a Cyclone, Overwhelmed By an Avalanche, Inundated By a Tidal Wave and Swallowed Up by an Earthquake,

The Democratic Party is Lost Amid the Abomination of Desolation That Has Overtaken It.

Hill Snowed Under In New York—The House of Representatives Republican By Over 150 Majority and the Senate Lost to Us.

KENTUCKY JOINS THE PROCESSION AND RETURNS FOUR REPUBLICANS OUT OF THE ELEVEN CONGRESSMEN.

IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY THE OLD SHIP WAS SCUTTLED AND WENT TO THE BOTTOM ALONG WITH THE REST—JOE KENDALL WINS BY A NARROW MARGIN.

THE REPS. TOOK EVERYTHING.

The Democratic party went before the country on Tuesday last and met with one of the most disastrous defeats it has ever experienced. From ocean to ocean and from Maine to Texas the story is the same. Read it in almost any one State, even in any one district or county, and it is the history of the day's doing in nearly every other. The pluralities, too, are almost without a precedent. New York over 153,000; Pennsylvania over 233,000; West Virginia, 30,000, and so the story runs.

Indiana, Iowa, Wisconsin and West Virginia, among other States, send solid Republican delegations. Michigan elect, 122 members to her legislature, and among them a lone Democrat. He should resign and make the thing unanimous.

Perhaps nowhere was a more crushing defeat sustained than that of Senator Hill of New York, Morton's plurality over him reaching the enormous figures of 153,442 votes.

Hon. W. L. Wilson, Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee of the Fifty-third Congress, met his Waterloo as did Tom Johnson, of Ohio; Springer, of Illinois; Cooper and Hobman, of Indiana; Sickles and Cummings, of New York, and "Silver Dick" Bland, of Missouri.

County tickets from "end to end" of the country went down in the general crash.

Kentucky did not escape, four out of the eleven Congressmen are Republicans. The Delegation from this State will stand:

- First District, John K. Hendrick, (Dem.)
- Second District, John D. Clardy (Dem.)
- Third District, W. G. Hunter (Rep.)
- Fourth District, John W. Lewis (Rep.)

W. C. Owens wins in the Seventh or Ashland District by a majority of 101. Judge Danny, his opponent will contest Owens' election.

For Judge of Court of Appeals in the Louisville District, Toney was elected by only 40 votes. In the Second Appellate District, D. L. B. Gully, who has been of every political complexion namable was elected over Judge Reeves, Democrat, by 688 votes.

In our own Congressional District Jo M. Kendall defeated N. T. Hopkins the Republican candidate, by the small majority 104. Beckner wins over Bosley for the short term by a greatly decreased majority. Two years ago this district gave Lisle (Dem.) a majority of 2772 over Russell (Rep.) now Kendall wins by a scratch and Beckner by a majority that will fall below 800.

When it comes to Montgomery county, the tale is like all the rest, wherever a Republican showed himself he was elected. Ed C. O'Rear, for County Judge, defeated A. B. White, Democrat, by 143 votes; G. L. Kirkpatrick (Rep.) received 73 votes over Lucien B. Green for County Clerk; Wallace McMahan was elected Constable of District No. 1 (Mt. Sterling) over M. C. Clay (Dem.) by 39 votes. Two years ago the county was carried by the Democrats by 468 majority.

Our sister county of Clark stood well to her work and gave the entire Democratic ticket handsome majorities. Bath fell down, like Montgomery, made a spectacle of herself. Louisville and Jefferson county defeats the Democratic ticket in almost every instance. Rolla Hart in the Ninth Congressional District is snowed under by Samuel J. Pugh.

Tom Paynter is the luckiest man alive. He knew just when to make the race for Congress, just how long to hold it and just when to let go. He secured the nomination for Appellate Judge, and having no opposition wins in spite of the tidal wave that swamped all around him.

Even in the Eleventh Congressional District where the Republicans were distracted by quarrels and divisions, and had two candidates in the

field and factions embittered against each other, Colson won by a handsome plurality. This year the Democrats couldn't win anything. The history of the day is one of disaster and defeat. The Democrats either stayed at home or came out and voted with the Republicans in large numbers. This, not in one district or in one section, but in almost every State and county in the whole country. The fact is, it was a great big funeral and nearly everybody was there to throw a shovelful of dirt on the party they were trying to kill. They have buried it, but they will find there will be a mighty resurrection two years hence. "Men die but principles never," and back of this party lie the truths upon which this Government was built, and though it may be now and then crushed to earth, it will rise again. Amid the numberless defeats the Democratic party has been subjected to for the last thirty-five years its enemies have again and again cried out it is dead, only to find it on the morrow facing them with more solid front than ever. There is no man living who is old enough to say he stood by the cradle of the Democratic party; there is no one young enough to say he will live to see its death.

Some Election Echoes.

McIntyre (Rep.) snowed the only Waite under in Colorado by a 20,000 plurality.

Young J. P. Fultz, a lawyer without ever having had a case in his life, barely eligible in point of years, and who had no kind of suspicion that he would win, beat Mr. Lee M. Woolfolk, a talented and experienced lawyer, for County Attorney of Jefferson county, Ky. Young Fultz had eked out a pre-

carious living by balling up Ivory Soap signs, now he steps into a position that pays him \$6,000 per year.

Llewellyn, of Kansas, the Populist candidate, went to wall like the rest. The tidal wave has opened up a chance for the return of John J. Ingalls to politics.

In Bath county it is said Clarence McAllister, the republican candidate for Attorney, played checkers all day with no suspicion that he had a chance of election. The result was a complete surprise to him. He got there Tennessee, with the balance of the earth, has gone Republican. It is only a question of majorities.

Strange to say in California the race is so close that the result has not yet been decided.

The Clark County Republicans are angry at County Clerk Ramsey, because he placed the "Straight Republicans" (or negro) ticket under the eagle and had only the coon left for the white Republican ticket. The law is imperative that the Clerk shall give the first of two parties asking a device, the preference. This Mr. Ramsey did. True, Mr. Hopkins later on called for a place under the eagle, but had he been placed there with the negroes, there would have been a howl sure enough gone up from the ranks of the faithful. It will be remembered that Mr. Hopkins and Mr. Bosley were both nominated by the "Republicans" and the eagle had already been given to the "Straight Republicans."

The Republicans not content with the few offices to which Democrats were elected, have begun quarrelling among themselves. Adams will contest Colson's election in the Eleventh District on the ground that Colson secured the Republican nomination by fraud.
