ST. HELENA'S TRANSFORMATION.

Island Now a Paradise Was Once Barren Volcanic Waste.

Charles Quincy Turner, writing on "The Magic of the Rain," in the Outing magazine, gives a very remarkable example of how a desert island may be transformed into a veritable paradise. By way of example, he cites the island of St. Helena, which was a barren volcanic waste at the time Napoleon was sent there. The following paragraph shows what a remarkable change came over the island at the arrival of the English:

"The Englishmen were there, however, to stay and for duty, and though they had to send to St. Helena for every drop of water they used, they set about a beginning of making something grow toward sustaining life, or at least modifying conditions. Gradually, by slow degrees but surely, their efforts were successful. Kindly nature requires but little encouragement, and the dews fell and crystalized and the herbage and shrubbery spread, and little trees took root and shed their seed, and the mountain in the long course of years became largely covered, until at last this one-time waterless heap of waste products of a lifeless volcano became able to provide millions upon millions of gallons of water, which is stored in its caverns for the ships that pass to and from the Cape of Good Hope and to Australia; and beneath the shades of the umbrageous terraces, high up in the cool air, the inviolated soldier from tropical Africa and India and the orient finds a restoring sanatorium which has brought back to health and life many a weary soul and stricken body. Truly there is magic in the rain and healing in the forests!"

THE OLDEST BREED OF DOGS.

Egyptian Gazelle Hound, a Wedding Present to Queen of Spain.

A beautiful Egyptian gazelle hound (Slugh) was among the wedding gifts of the young queen of Spain. The dog, which is a lovely pale cream color and named Saddan, was the gift of the Hon. Florence Amherst, who is a sister of Lady William Cecil, who has been in waiting on the queen of Spain in Madrid.

These desert hounds are among the latest of society's pets and bid fair to outrun in popularity even the aristocratic Borzoi, which is the nearest in character to the eastern greyhound, and is probably derived from him.

The Slughis are perhaps the oldest breed in the world, not even excepting the historic spaniel of the palace of Peking. Their form was sculptured on some of the earliest of Egyptian mural tablets, and some monuments preserve the names of favorite hounds of various kings.

The pedigrees of noble hounds notable for their speed in the chase are current to-day, having been traditionally handed down among the sheiks of Bedouin tribes of the deserts of Egypt and Arabia as from the days of Saladin, one of whose hounds was named Saadan, while Persian nobles claim that strains they own are older than either, and that the breed first originated in Persia.

The color of the Slugh is that of the desert over which he chases the gazelle, and varies as do the sands, from a rather deep fawn to the palest cream, which is almost white. The greyhound form is most distinctly preserved in the outline of the Slugh.

To Prevent House Burn.

W. B. Hawkins, a prominent farmer of Fayette county and leader of the Burley Tobacco Growers Association, has the following in the Lexington Observer:

"House burn or rotten tobacco is the worst of all tobacco. How to prevent that is the question. When the weather conditions are such that stalks get sticky, when the mould gets on everything in the house, when the air is heavy and still damp and foggy look out for house burn. Be very careful that no wet tobacco is hung in the barn and as soon as you have any suspicions, even if it is beginning to smut, it is time to be up and doing by artificial means what the north or west wind fails to do by natural means. My remedy is to get up a dry current of air through the tobacco at once and you will be surprised how quickly it can be done. Leave your barn open and fire. Do not make one or two big fires but make twenty or thirty fires all over the barn floor not bigger than your hat, made of charcoal or wood that will burn with a blaze, you will run the house burn out horse, foot and dragon in twelve hours. Remember a ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."
