**FOR PUBLIC INTEREST.**

The following is a resolution heartily and unanimously approved at a meeting of the State Guard assembled in session at Frankfort on the 6th, instant, which we approve just as cordially:

RESOLVED, That this Convention in the interest of the Kentucky State Guard and in accord with the action of other States in providing for their militia, does respectfully and earnestly urge upon the members of the Legislature that will assemble in January, 1908, to make such provision as will insure regular attendance at drills and other exercises necessary to the proper discipline and military training of the organized militia of Kentucky. To that end we state our belief that attendance by enlisted men and non-commissioned officers at drills, inspections, parades and other exercises prescribed for the instruction of the Kentucky State Guard, be construed as the performance of one day's duty and be paid for at the Government rate of pay for such enlisted men and non-commissioned officers when on duty. No charge shall be presented against the State by any regiment of the Kentucky State Guard for more than fifty-two attendances per annum, at such exercises, by any member of any company, battalion or regiment.

The pay as prescribed by the United States Government is the pittance of 43c per day of 52 days or \$22.36 per capita per year. If the State has a militia at all it should be well organized. To this all Kentuckians will be agreed. The amount is comparatively nothing, but it is an incentive to greater efforts. The member who will secure the enactment of a law, embodying the provisions of this resolution may live to realize the good service he has performed for his State.

The military has frequent emergency calls and this law would guarantee better trained men for service. Again, if we are to expect much of our Kentucky soldiers, we must show our appreciation of them. And again, it secures a better class of men; men who would contend for a principle with their lives. Give the State the men of high morals and they will bring things to pass.

Stanford White, the defamer of woman's priceless jewel, character, traduced the name of woman when he convinced innocent, unsuspecting girls that all women are of easy virtue. Such degenerates are dangerous retrogrades, unworthy the freedom of the living. **CITY STATEMENTS—A COMPARISON.**

We have made a careful examination of the recently published financial statement of the city for the year 1906, also the statement for the year 1905, which was re-published, as stated by the Mayor, for the purpose of comparison.

Considering these statements carefully, as intended, the appendix to the report proper and the statement of the Mayor in conjunction, but for our knowledge of the fairness of those who made reports for this statement their freedom from political methods, we might conclude the object to be rather for the furtherance of political fortunes.

In comparing the financial statements for the years 1905 and 1906 we find that at the end of the year 1905 there was cash in the Treasury, \$14,298.57; there were outstanding vouchers, \$23,299.64; thus showing an indebtedness at the end of that year of \$9,091.07. In the financial statement of January 1, 1907, we find cash in Treasury, \$9,715.69; there were outstanding vouchers, \$10,895.53; thus showing an indebtedness at that time of \$1,179.84. In other words as shown by comparison of these reports the indebtedness of the city was reduced \$8,911.23 from the 30th day of December, 1905, to the 1st day of January, 1907. The incorrectness of this statement is apparent for an examination of the report of receipts and disbursements for the year ending December 31, 1906, shows

that the receipts in excess of expenditures for that year are \$2,956.83 and this is the entire amount that could be applied to the payment of the old indebtedness of \$9,091.07 as far as the published statement shows.

These are facts, and our mathematics will not justify the statement of the reduction of city indebtedness, as appears in statement. We only wish they could accommodate us in arriving at such a condition. The payment of \$2,956.83 on an obligation of \$9,091.07 will not reduce it to \$1,179.84—figurers won't work that way. But, should we go into the business of 1907, and take the fund accruing from licenses, which belong to a report to be rendered January 1, 1908—"Take from Peter to pay Paul," leaving the current expenses to care for themselves, this reduction might be made. This, however, is the only way we can reconcile the appendix with the report proper, a putting of two years' reports—or parts thereof, into one. We will have more to say next week.
