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## INTER-STATE SHIPMENT

### Of Whisky Must Be Marked Whiskey On Outside of Package.

One of the most important of the new provisions of the revised penal code which became effective January 3 is that designed to prevent the sale of liquor, under the form of shipments, in States which have adopted prohibition. Imprisonment for not more than two years and payment of a fine of not more than \$5,000 is the penalty provided in one of the sections to be imposed upon any officer, agent or employe of any common carrier who shall knowingly deliver or cause to be delivered to any person other than the person to whom it has been consigned, unless on the written order of the bona fide consignee or to any person under a fictitious name, any intoxicating liquor shipped from another State or Territory, or from a foreign country.

Another section prohibits any common carrier, including railroads and express companies, from collecting the purchase price, or any part of it, from the consignee in connection with the transportation of intoxicating liquor from one State to another or from acting in any way as the agent for the buyer or seller of liquor. A penalty of \$5,000 is attached for violation. A third section affecting inter-state shipments of liquor requires the marking of all such shipments on the outside with the name of the consignee and the quantity and kind of intoxicants. Liquor which is shipped and not so labeled is subject to seizure and confiscation and the person responsible is liable to a fine of not more than \$5,000.

## J. W. PERRY,

### Of Morgan County, Not Recognized By Democratic Caucus.

In the organization of the Democratic caucus and before the result of the rollcall had been announced J. W. Perry, of West Liberty, arose and called attention to the fact that his name had been omitted from the rollcall.

"As a Democrat I demand that you call my name and place it on the roll," he said.

"I understand that you made your race under the Republican emblem, the log cabin," said Mr. Prewitt.

"No, sir, I was a Democrat 100 years before I was born," said Mr. Perry, "as my Virginia ancestors were Democrats, and the blood of Democrats runs in my veins. While I made my race under the Republican emblem I was forced to do it, with the understanding that I was a Democrat. There is not a drop of Republican blood in my veins."

"You are out of order, Mr. Perry," said Mr. Prewitt. "Unless the members of this caucus express a desire to hear you I must ask that you be seated."

A wait of a few seconds failed to disclose an objection to Mr. Perry, and he continued:

"They robbed me of my nomination and I had to go under the log cabin or remain at home. These are the facts. Slap me in the face and you slap 5,000 Democrats in the face."

L. C. Owens, of Jefferson county, interrupted at this point and said:

"I would go down to defeat as a Democrat 1,000 times before I would put my name under a Republican emblem."

Mr. Prewitt suggested to Mr. Perry that his only remedy seemed to lie in the courts, and that he would have to insist that Mr. Perry surrender the floor. He did so.
