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JAMES E. HUGHES

Is a Self Made Young Man and Deserves Great Credit.

James E. Hughes, proprietor of the Hughes Printery, one of the leading establishments in its line in Central Kentucky, and State Printer for some years under Governor Beckham's administration, is a self made young man, and deserves great credit for the way he has built up a splendid plant and a profitable business from small beginnings.

Born on a farm near Mt. Sterling, his early life was spent in rural pursuits, but at the age of seventeen he decided to quit the plow and the furrow that was always too long, and seek his fortune in town. He turned his footsteps toward Lexington and found his first employment with Alderman E. D. Veach, who was conducting a printing establishment in the old printery building occupied by the Leader, on North Upper street.

He was an apt student in the printing art and by industry and application during his term of apprenticeship he reached a state of proficiency that justified him in going into business on his own account. He opened a modest print shop on E. Third street, and his most important contract for some years was the printing of the Blue Grass Blade for Charles C. Moore, who constituted him his publisher and advertising manager. It was in this little shop that Mr. Hughes put in a Linotype, the first installed by a Lexington job printer.

From this little shop on a quiet residence street, Mr. Hughes' next step was to a down-town room on West Short street in the Farrell building, in which he prospered and enlarged his plant. Subsequently he secured several big contracts for State printing and removed to his present location on North Limestone street, where he has added immensely to his printing machinery and put in a binding plant. His establishment is now one of the most complete in Eastern Kentucky, employing from 20 to 30 people, and turning out as high as \$100,000 worth of printing a year. He has a large branch house in Louisville working on calendars and specialties, with a force of traveling salesmen.

Mr. Hughes is a very busy man, but he is of a happy, accommodating disposition, makes friends easily, and finds time for a little recreation now and then, base ball being his favorite pastime. He is an Elk, a Macabee and an Eagle, and also a Democrat, but he does not bother much with politics.

Mr. Hughes married Miss Willie E. Waller, and a bright boy eleven years old is an important member of their household.—Lexington Leader of April 24.

ELEPHANTS ESCAPE.

Several Men Injured and Houses Upset at Danville, Ill.

Several persons were injured and property damaged to the amount of thousands of dollars was caused when eight bulls and one female elephant of Ringling's show stampeded at Danville, Ill., on April 27.

As the pachyderms were being unloaded, after several hours' ride from Chicago, one of the bulls made a break for liberty, bowling over the keeper and escaping.

He was followed by seven other bulls. Later, while the entire force of trainers and keepers were engaged in the unusual sport of hunting elephants in automobiles, the female escaped.

For several hours the elephants were at large despite the fact that the entire force of police reserves were called into action and gave chase.

After escaping the elephants moved for some time in a bunch and then separated. They stopped for nothing except brick and stone buildings. Small frame structures, coal sheds, fences and trees in their path were pushed aside or turned over, uprooted and thrown to one side.

At the home of Wm. Miller, three elephants found there was not sufficient room for them to pass between the summer kitchen and the residence and pushed the kitchen aside, badliff frightening the persons therein.

At the home of Joseph Peebles, after overturning a shed and killing a horse, one of the animals attacked the man, and hurled him against the side of his residence, and he is now in a critical condition.

F. Krabbe, one of the keepers, who was assisting in taking three of the bulls to their quarters in the cars was hurled against the side of a barn and seriously injured.

Other persons were slightly injured during the stampede. More than a hundred homes were visited by the elephants during the rampage. Truck gardens, orchards and many buildings were absolutely ruined in the outskirts of the city by the elephants.
