Sam C. Estes Dead.

Sam C. Estes was found dead in bed on last Monday night just before one o'clock. Mr. Estes had been complaining with pains in his stomach before retiring but seemed better, however, when his family went to see about him during the night they found him dead. Mr. Estes was a man of wide acquaintance and was a prominent and popular man both in this and Clark county. He was sixty two years of age and had been a member of the Masonic order for many years. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Margaret Estes, and three children, Mrs. J. D. Spalding, of Catlettsburg, Geo. M. Estes, of Burnside, and Clyde G. Estes, of near Kiddville. The funeral services were held at the Kiddville Baptist Church Tuesday, interment in Machpelah cemetery.

More Trouble in Breathitt.

Anse White shot and killed Jason Deaton Sunday near Jackson. Deaton was shot three times through the head. The killing occurred Sunday afternoon at Anse White's home in the lower edge of Breathitt county near the Perry county line, where the Deatons, Whites and many relatives of both families live in the same neighborhood. White was slightly wounded in the thigh while, besides killing Jason Deaton, White shot Luke Begley, who had accompanied Deaton to White's home, in the head and shoulder, but it is thought that Begley will recover.

Office Board Trade. Lexington, Ky., Oct. 25, 1864.

This is to certify that George W. Anderson of Mt. Gomery County, State of Kentucky has permission to ship Merchandise of all kinds out of and into the state of Kentucky for four (4) months unless sooner revoked.

By order of Maj. Gen. Burbridge. Mr. Anderson said he had driven a large number of hogs to Paris to be shipped, there being no railroad here at that time but that upon arriving at Paris he found it impossible to ship without a permit. After three trips to Lexington he at last secured the above instrument. The paper is in a good state of preservation the ink and printing being very distinct.

Marshal, while endeavoring to arrest him, and at the same time Mike Gibbons shot and killed Walter Allen, a brother of Clint Allen. His case will be called next. The attorneys for the Commonwealth are assisted by Hon. A. Floyd Byrd.
