NEW LOOSE LEAF HOUSE

Well Known Firm Of Kirkpatrick & Clay To Build In The Spring

The well known tobacco firm of Kirkpatrick & Clay will begin this spring the erection of a modern loose leaf tobacco warehouse. Same will be located adjoining the Farmers Tobacco Warehouse Co., on Sycamore street adjoining the railroad. It is reported that a house with a floor capacity of 200,000 pounds will be constructed. The building of this house will be of great benefit to the growers in this section, as it will give a floor capacity of handling over 600,000 pounds every day and will make four nice pricing departments, ample to handle all the tobacco that will be sold, and at the same time will cause to be brought here three or four new buyers, as the new men in the loose leaf field are widely known in tobacco circles throughout the country and will have a strong pull in the way of securing new buyers for this market. The changes will cost about \$10,000. With Messrs Kirkpatrick & Clay at the helm of a new loose leaf market every effort will be made to increase from 6,000,000 market to a 10,000,000 market in another year and it can be done. Work on the new improvements will begin as soon as the weather will permit.

COMMISSION BILL ADOPTED

Unanimously By House Of Representatives at Frankfort Tuesday

House Bill No. 494, written by County Attorney Earl W. Senff and introduced in the Legislature by Representative John A. Judy, was, on motion of Mr. Judy advanced, put on its passage and passed by a majority of 65 to 0 yesterday morning.

This bill puts into force the commission plan of government in Montgomery county at the November election, 1915, which is the earliest time the three Commissioners can legally be elected and carries into effect the will of the people of our county, expressed last fall, when a change in the management of our fiscal affairs was decided upon, by a majority of 1106. This bill applies to Montgomery county alone and was introduced after serious objections were made to several provisions of Senate Bill No. 205, prepared by the Louisville Commercial Club and introduced by Senator J. Will Clay and which last named bill was intended to apply to Jefferson, Bell, McCracken and Montgomery counties.

The Judy bill will be rushed to the Senate as speedily as possible and it is hoped that it will be adopted by that body within the next week. By having his bill considered in preference to several hundred other bills previously introduced, Representative Judy proved himself to be a "live wire."
