AS EMPEROR HAD PREDICTED

Course of History Bore Out Presentment Which Had Afflicted the Great Napoleon.

Napoleon the Great was exceedingly superstitious. The following is told as one of the illustrations of this: When Napoleon, in the spring of 1799, was lying before Acre, he was anxious for news from upper Egypt, whither he had despatched Dessaix in pursuit of a distinguished Mameluke leader. Not many days after a courier arrived with dispatches, favorable in the main, but reporting one tragical occurrence on a small scale that to Napoleon outweighed the public prosperity. RIDDING CHEESE OF MITES

High-Frequency Currents of Electricity Are Employed for the Purpose by French Scientist.

Not satisfied with ripening peaches by electricity, a French scientist has hit upon the plan of ridding cheese of mites by the application of powerful high-frequency currents.

He has invented a brush with fine silver bristles. The brush is connected with a powerful high-frequency apparatus and then is passed slowly over the surface of the cheese. The surface is bathed in heatless sparks and the organisms are instantly electrocuted. This scientific expert also has had remarkable success in ripening cheese by electricity.

American ingenuity, however, has overshadowed this Frenchman. We are told the most successful raisers of broilers for the city markets have discovered that electricity is an indispensable aid in promoting the growth of chickens. Since the chicken does its feeding exclusively in the daytime, electric lights in the brooders play a trick upon the unsuspecting fowl and makes him a glutton. He eats all the food he requires in eight hours and utilizes another eight hours to digest it. Thus the chicks live three electric days in two ordinary days and consequently reaches the markets weeks ahead of their country cousins.

HELBURN FREED ON CHARGE OF MURDER

Maj. E. S. Helburn, former Mayor of Middleboro, was acquitted on the charge of killing Alf Farmer, upon motion of County Attorney C. I. Dawson, after all the evidence had been introduced by the Commonwealth and it was clearly shown that Maj. Helburn was justified in taking the life of Alf Farmer, to save the life of Lee Rennebaum.

The examining trial was held before Magistrates J. Y. Page, of Pineville, and John Hurst, of Middleboro, in the absence of County Judge T. J. Asher. Their verdict was justifiable homicide.

Farmer had assaulted a woman in the commissary of the Yellow Creek Coal Company. Rennebaum, an employe of the company, tried to make Farmer cease. Farmer then turned upon Rennebaum with a gun and fired one shot, and was in the act of firing another shot, when Helburn shot Farmer. Maj. Helburn came to Middleboro several years ago and is much interested in the coal development in that section.
