Reductions in newspaper advertising rates would be financially disastrous at the present time, publishers and advertising executives from all parts of the country declared at a meeting of officers and directors of the National Association of Newspaper Executives in Louisville Saturday.

"Retailers of the country who are able to buy merchandise on a falling market throughout the country expect to find advertising rates on newspapers decreasing," Charles Miller, Atlanta, president of the association, said in addressing the meeting. "This is absolutely impossible. On the contrary, rates in many cities will have to advance."

## Harding Calls An Extra Session

A formal call for an extra session of Congress, to meet April 11, and receive legislative recommendations from the new administration has been issued by President Harding.

None of the specific problems to be laid before the legislative branch were named in the proclamation, the President merely declaring that an extraordinary occasion required that Congress convene "to receive such communication as may be made by the executive."

Mr. Harding already has indicated, however, that the tariff and the taxation will be foremost in his message to the special session. He is expected to make a special plea for prompt relief to the nation's agricultural interests, and the list of the recommendations may touch many other subjects such as the railway situation, the merchant marine and immigration.

## Jailer Will Not Be Reinstated by Morrow

Governor Edwin P. Morrow yesterday refused to reinstate John H. Edger as jailer of Woodford county. Edger was removed from office by the governor following the lynching of Richard James, a negro, who was taken from the jail in Versailles on the night of March 12.

"It is the duty of a jailer," said the governor, "to resist a mob until he is beaten into insensibility or killed. Accepting Edger's own statement as facts in the case, he did nothing to defend the prisoner, asked for no help and demanded no assistance."

Edger had admitted while being examined at the hearing for reinstatement that he had made no outcry or call for assistance when the mob came to his house for the keys to the jail, as he did not propose to be killed or have members of his family killed.

## W. C. T. U. to Start Fight on Tobacco

A campaign by the Women's Christian Temperance Union for strict Sunday observance and against tobacco has been announced by Miss Anna A. Gordon, national president, to start April 3.

That week, the announcement said, will be made a week of prayer for the success of the campaign, and Sunday, April 10, is designated as Anti-Tobacco Sunday, when literature to be sent out to W. C. T. U. branches, churches, schools, and colleges, will be distributed. Large signs, announcing the program for the campaign, will be sent out soon, Miss Gordon said.

"The call for the week of prayer," said Miss Gordon's announcement, "is for every organization throughout our land that believes the Christian Sabbath fundamental for the perpetuation of our nation."

Among the violations of Sunday as a day of rest the announcement stated that 400,000 persons now are working on Sunday in this country, and restrictions are to be sought on golfing, pleasure automobiling, base ball, movies, theaters and dancing, on Sunday, in the campaign.

## \$150,000 Fire At Lexington

Fire believed to have started from a defective electrical wiring in the elevator shaft, caused a loss of approximately \$125,000 to the stock and equipment of Hurst & Company, wholesale fruit and grocery dealers, Lexington, and \$25,000 damage to the building, occupied by that company and owned by the Faulkner estate, under direction of the Security Trust Company, before the flames were finally under control at 2 o'clock this morning.

The flames, fanned by the air current through the elevator shaft, flashed in a blaze which spread rapidly through the three-story building occupied by the Hurst Company, and in which the wholesale institution had its offices and store rooms, containing canned goods and fresh fruits and vegetables.

Before the fire was subdued, three residences on Upper street were set afire by sparks and the blaze also caught to the adjoining buildings occupied by Joseph Papania and Egalite Wilson Company. No considerable damage, however, was done to any of the other buildings.

## Salt Lick Police Judge Held Without Bond

E. C. Kimbrell, police judge of Salt Lick, was held without bond to the May grand jury at his examining trial at Owingsville yesterday, for the murder of Ed. Bailey, March 7, at a store in Salt Lick. Kimbrell will be confined in the Owingsville jail instead of in Mt. Sterling, where he was taken at his own request after the shooting.

Ed. Fanning, the only witness to the shooting, except Bailey's son, Russell Bailey, testified yesterday. He said the two Baileys were already in the store when Kimbrell entered with a pistol in his hand, and with an oath demanded that the elder Bailey retract a statement he had made two days before. Russell Bailey, Fanning said, seized Kimbrell's arms from behind, but Kimbrell jerked up his hand, firing as he did so, the first shot killing Ed. Bailey. The other shots went wild, the witness said.

Kimbrell's attorneys are W. B. White and Judge R. H. Winn, of this city, and Judge E. C. O'Rear, of Frankfort.
