The question of "gitting" a jury was somewhat agitated by the Commonwealth's Attorney in the Circuit Court the first of the week.

Rev. J. B. Cottrell, D. D., of Louisville, will deliver a lecture in this city Tuesday evening next for the benefit of the Methodist Church.

Mrs. Annie B. Cook has rented Col. J. Stoddard Johnston's cottage on the corner of Main and Second streets, and has removed there to reside.

The new depot at Jet's Station has been completed and trains stop there regularly now. Mr. James R. Shaw is the agent and Mr. Lee A. Owen assistant.

Hiram Lodge, No. 4, A. Y. M., meets in regular monthly communication on Tuesday evening next, at Esoteric Lodge, No. 532, on Wednesday evening.

The grand jury in the Jefferson Circuit Court, on Tuesday, returned a true bill against Thomas Crittenden for the willful murder of Rose Mosby, colored.

Messrs. Jake & Joe Swigert have two colts entered for the spring races at Lexington, viz: Carlisle, by Ten Broeck, dam Nellie Brady, and Worth, by King Ban, dam Maliste by Asteroid.

In the Circuit Court Tuesday morning Moses Booker, colored, plead guilty to the charge of having stolen 30 yards of carpet from Mr. Peter Sower, and was given one year in the penitentiary.

The meeting of the Circuit and County Courts drew a large crowd to town Monday, but sales of stock were few. The horse swappers were on hand, however, in force and did quite a lively business.

The telephone exchange will be removed in a few days from the Western Union Telegraph office to the corner room in the third story of the Mansion House Building, which is a much more appropriate place for it.

We have been shown by Mr. B. B. Jeffers an ear of corn grown by Mr. Wade Dawson, of Anderson county, which is almost the exact shape of a human hand. The thumb, four fingers, wrist, and palm of the hand are remarkably well defined.

The new City Council met Tuesday night and unanimously re-elected Hon. E. H. Taylor, jr., Mayor and Mr. Frank V. Gray City Clerk. Owing to the illness of Mayor Taylor they then adjourned for one week or to meet at the call of the Mayor.

Capt. E. O. Hawkins the sheriff elect, failed to give bond on Monday, the office was declared vacant and Mr. John W. Gaines appointed to fill the vacancy until the next August election, who gave bond and entered upon the discharge of his duties.

The trial of Frank Egbert for the murder of Jerry Lee was begun Wednesday afternoon in the Circuit Court. It required until Thursday afternoon to get a jury, but the taking of evidence was begun as soon as the panel was complete, and is still in progress.

In Nashville, Tennessee, the police throw all the concealed deadly weapons they find upon the persons of citizens of that city into the river. It would be a good idea for the police of this place to throw not only the weapons but some of those who carry them into the river.

The new Councilmen are being besieged by hungry office seekers. Mr. Dan Mengher, sr., was called up out of his bed, about eleven o'clock Monday night, by one of them who thought he was elected one of the representatives of the Third Ward instead of his son, Mr. John Mengher.

The Lawrenceburg Telephone Company having failed to pay the rent of their instruments to the East Tennessee Bell Telephone Company, the agent of the latter, Tuesday morning, "cut out" their instrument in this city, and thus put a stop to the working of the line between this place and Lawrenceburg.

Pilot John S. Stout, the former Frankfort boy who stood at the wheel of the ill-fated steamer R. E. Lee when she was burned, on the night of the 30th of September, and never left his post until he had run her ashore, was presented with a gold watch and chain, a few days since, by his admiring friends in Memphis.

Two gentlemen of the same name reside on the South Side, one single and the other married, and the married one has a young lady cousin that has not seen him for years, who came to the city a few days ago, and in looking up her relatives ran across the single gentleman and claimed kin with him. The young man took in the situation, and as she was good looking, became as affectionate as could be desired, and now the young lady drops in to see him every day or two, thinking she has found her long lost cousin.

The switch engine started up the railroad Thursday morning with two hand-cars filled with section hands in tow, for the purpose of doing some repairing to the track. When in front of the Spring Hill Distillery, both hand-cars jumped the track, were overturned, and the hands thrown in every direction. Fortunately they were only running at the rate of about ten or twelve miles an hour and no one was seriously injured, only a few bruises being received. One man who saw the accident says that the air was filled with fishmen for a second.

The Queen's Insurance Company, of Liverpool, represented by Judge W. H. Sneed, and the Phoenix of London, represented by Messrs. Payne & Berry, have settled with the congregation of the Christian Church for the damage done their house of worship by fire on the 24th of December, the loss being fixed at \$768.64, each company paying half. The windows have been repaired, the floor is being relaid, and it is thought the Church can be used for service to-morrow week. The damage done the walls will not be repaired until warm weather, and the carpet will be patched up so as to make it do until that time.
