Hon. Robt. Bain, Senator from Lincoln, Boyle and Garrard counties in the last Legislature, died at his home in Lincoln county Sunday night of cancer of the stomach.

Mr. Vivian Lewis, son of Dr. J. M. Lewis, while skating on roller skates in the ball room of the Capital Hotel Saturday night, fell and broke his right arm near the wrist.

Why can't we have a Mardi Gras parade this year? There is a little more than a week's time to prepare for it, and the first and best one ever seen in this city was gotten up in less time.

If you wish to attend the Mardi Gras festivities at New Orleans, the L. & N. Railroad will sell you a round trip ticket from this place to that city for twenty-four dollars, good until March 1st.

Rev. Wm. H. Hampton, who has for the last nine years had charge of the mission church of St. John's in the Wilderness, will go to Louisville about the first of February to take charge of a church in that city.

While running out in answer to a false alarm of fire, Saturday night, one of the wheels of the fire engine went through the top of the cistern at the corner of St. Clair and Mero streets.

The C. & O. Railroad Company have been sending a number of new freight cars through this city this week. They were built at Huntington, West Virginia, and are intended for the Elizabethtown & Paducah division of the road.

The alarm of fire Monday afternoon was occasioned by a stovepipe setting fire to a plank ceiling, through which it passed, in the residence of Thos. Gordon, colored, on Mero street. The flames were extinguished with buckets and no water was thrown by the department, though they were on hand promptly.

Mr. Garret Biley, an old and respected Irish citizen of this city, died at his residence opposite the Cemetery gate, on Tuesday afternoon, after three months' illness. He was eighty-five years old, and had been for thirteen years keeper of the Cemetery gate. His funeral took place from the Catholic Church Wednesday afternoon and was largely attended.

One or two of the stoves in the Public School building fell down the first of the week, and created quite a stir in the rooms in which they were. The Trustees at once had an examination made of all the stoves in the building, and most of them were found to be warped or burned out, and believing that "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," they at once ordered them replaced by new ones, for fear that some of the balance might tumble over, create a panic, and some of the children be killed in the general rush that would be made to get out of the house.
