OFFICE COMMISSIONER OF AGRICULTURE, FRANKFORT, KY., NOV. 20, 1884.

With the view of directing the attention of the Farmers of Kentucky to obtain Seed Corn of the best varieties grown in the State, the Annual Corn Show will be held at this office on December 30th, 1884. The following premiums will be awarded: First and second premiums at \$15 and \$10 each for the following varieties, viz: White Corn, Bread Corn, Pled or Mixed Corn, and Cattle Corn. A premium of \$15 for best sample of Hominy Corn. Each sample must be sent in a separate package, marked legibly with the name of the exhibitor and the address in full, and the name of the variety, and the package may be sent by freight at the charge of this office. Each sample must contain not less than Thirty Ears, and must be sent in the ear in boxes, with only one variety in each package. A list of premiums is offered by the "World's Industrial Exposition at New Orleans," for Yellow Corn and White Corn, first and second premium \$5 and \$3 each. All samples of Corn exhibited here will be forwarded and placed with the Kentucky State Exhibit at New Orleans, free of charge to exhibitor, for competition before a new set of judges. It is therefore to be hoped that the Corn Show here will have quite a number of samples of the different varieties to compete for premiums, in order that the great State of Kentucky may lay claims to the honor of being the banner State or Country for this article, at the New Orleans Exposition. It is my purpose to purchase about one hundred and fifty bushels of the premium Corn for distribution through the members of the Legislature to the various counties.


