Deaths.

DEAKINS—We clip the following from Bagdad letter in the Shelby News: "Mr. John T. Deakins, a highly respected citizen of this community, who has been suffering so long with Bright's disease, passed away Saturday evening, December 29th, and was buried Monday at Lebanon."

The deceased was the father of Mrs. Jas. A. Violet, of this city, and for several years a resident of Bellepoint.

NOLAND—Little Clinton W., infant son of Mr. Walker Noland, died at the home of his parents in Bellepoint yesterday morning, aged 4 years.

SMITH—Mr. D. Howard Smith, jr., died suddenly in Louisville, Ky., on last Saturday morning. He was the oldest son of the late Col. D. Howard Smith, a very prominent Kentuckian, and formerly Auditor of the State. For a good many years Howard, jr.,

was a resident of this city and was a general favorite with everybody, and all who knew him loved him.

He was one of the politest gentlemen we ever knew, and he made it the aim of his life never knowingly to offend anyone. A Christian at heart, he led here a quiet and peaceful life, void of offense toward his fellow-men, and died with the hope of a beautiful immortality.

May the sod rest lightly on that noble and generous heart. Wait for us, brother, in the Land of the Leal.

SULLIVAN—Mr. Mike Sullivan was run over and killed by a railroad train at his home, LaFayette, Indiana, on Saturday, December 29th, while waiting to take the train for Florida, where he was going to undertake a railroad contract. The deceased was formerly of this city and was a son of the late Frank Sullivan. His mother still resides here, and left Sunday to attend the funeral. Only a few minutes before his death he had purchased an accident insurance ticket for \$3,000, good for the time required to make the trip to Florida.

The LaFayette Journal, of December 31st, gives the following notice of his death:

"Michael A. Sullivan who had his left foot cut off at the South St. depot Thursday morning by a Big Four Passenger train, died Saturday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock at St. Elizabeth hospital where he had been confined since the accident.

His death is attributable to loss of blood and shock to his nervous system. Mr. Sullivan was 42 years old and leaves a widow and nine children. He was a man of splendid physique and it was believed he would rally from the effects of the accident. Mr. Sullivan was a roadmaster on the Monon railway for years, and was also employed as a freight conductor on that road. At the time of his death he was employed as a railroad contractor and was filling a contract in Florida. During his life he accumulated some property and also carried \$6,000 insurance. He had a wide acquaintance among railroad men and was quite popular. The terrible manner in which he met his death was a shock to all, and has caused general regret. Mr. Sullivan's family resides on Union near the condiment factory. Mr. Sullivan was a member of the Catholic Church and received the last rites of the church before his death."
