### Lectures Before the Women's Club.

Several of our most prominent physicians have generously agreed to deliver a course of lectures before the Economic Department of the Women's Club, who are at present especially interested in the study of municipal and domestic hygiene.

Dr. Goler had spoken to the department some time ago on pure water, and the subject selected for the first lecture of this course was air and sunlight.

We regret that space will only allow us to refer to the most important points in Dr. James' lecture. He first briefly, but clearly, described the construction and properties of the atmosphere, the erosion and propagation of light, the far reaching and almost omnipotent influence of sun rays, the myriad of worlds and "the realm of the infinitely great" that the telescope and spectrum have enabled us to locate and analyze.

Dr. James' complete familiarity with his subjects, and simple manner of expression made even the abstruse discourses of Russen, Kirchhof and others attractive and instructive. The women, however, seemed to listen with more personal, if not absorbed interest, when Dr. James described the influence of air and sunlight on our streets, and when he closed the chairman of the department expressed the sentiment of every woman present, saying that she wished every health officer and town councilman in the State could have heard that lecture.

Dr. James accentuated the fact that an epidemic in pure atmosphere is as impossible as health in a foul; that every offensive odor is a danger sign.

nal to be neglected at one's peril; that a single back yard or alley overlooked by the criminal carelessness of a health officer, or scarcely less criminal weakness of neighbors who "hate to be disagreeable," may poison the air of an entire street. Among his practical suggestions to housekeepers Dr. James urged that naked floors, or at least matting, should be used instead of carpets, and that before sweeping they should be sprinkled with some simple diluted disinfectant; also that walls and furniture should be wiped down, otherwise dust would simply be shifted from lower to higher resting places.
