

A FIGHT FOR THE RIGHT.

We have noticed, with no little interest, the fight now being made by the manufacturers of straight Kentucky whisky against the rectifiers and blenders of that article.

With an experience of near twenty years in the revenue service, we think we are somewhat qualified to speak with knowledge upon this question.

If there ever was any reason for the pure food law, there are equally as cogent and unanswerable reasons in favor of a law which will require every blender and rectifier of whisky to label his goods with just exactly what they contain. At best, there is no doubt of the injury accruing to any one who indulges to excess in even the purest and best whisky to be had; and when it comes to using the vile stuff that is so ruthlessly and shamelessly offered for consumption as "fine old Kentucky whisky," there is no wonder at the wreck and ruin that follow.

It is within our knowledge that, from dumps of the worst brands of high wines, filled with fusil oil and other deleterians, there is manufactured by these blenders and rectifiers almost any kind of drink that can be called for in fashionable as well as in the lower walks of life.

The basis of all these are bad enough, but when, in addition, the vile drugs, false bead, etc., are placed in these compounds, there is no wonder at the awful consequences following their use. In many of the large cities we read of men and women crazed by the use of these stimulants; their lives made a hell on earth, their families starving and penniless; and at last the suicide's grave and the drunkard's deep damnation; that there is no wonder the cry goes up to at least remedy some of these horrors by affording those who must have stimulants pure and unadulterated articles.

In our experience as a government officer we have had occasion, in the line of our duty, to inspect these concoctions, and, time and again, in the brief space required for their inspection, have we had the skin upon our hands caused to shrivel and become as dry and dead as parchment. And this stuff is taken into the much more delicate organs of the stomach to do its work of wreck and ruin to body and soul.

For years we have urged that the government should not make itself particeps criminis by countenancing and authorizing these vile concoctions to be sent out and branded as "Pure Kentucky Whisky."

We hope that the war now on will arouse the conscience of our Congressmen and Legislators to a sense of their duty in this respect, and lead to the passage of laws throwing the same safeguards around the purity of this class of goods as are now thrown around other articles of domestic consumption.
