It seems that two coopers (employed at the big coopershops of Messrs. W. A. Gaines & Co.) went to the Arcade Saloon, on Broadway street, about 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon, and began drinking.

As is usually the case, "when booze goes in, brains go out." One Jacob Dossenbach pulled his gun and shot George Miller four times, three of the shots inflicted fatal wounds.

Dossenbach tried to fire the fifth shot at the prostrate man (who went down at the first fire), but the cartridge failed to explode. Three of the shots were in the abdomen and the fourth in the thigh.

Drs. Fish and Keller were immediately summoned, and after an examination, which showed the terrible nature of his wounds, had Miller taken to the King's Daughters Hospital, where every thing was done that was possible, but the man lingered in great pain until

Dossenbach attempted to leave the saloon directly after the shooting, but Mr. D. L. Kennedy, the proprietor, came in the door just as he attempted to flee, and prevented his going until Officer Wm. Hayden arrived and placed him under arrest, and he was lodged in jail.

There are many rumors afloat as to the origin of the difficulty, but we prefer to await the evidence before publishing anything further.

Coroner L. S. Graham held an inquest on Monday afternoon and the verdict of the jury was that Miller came to his death from pistol shots inflicted by Dossenbach.

We regret exceedingly that this horrible affair should have occurred in Mr. Kennedy's place, as he has always preserved the peace and has been noted for having an orderly house. We doubt if the affair would have occurred had he been on the ground when it commenced.

IT OUGHT TO BE DONE.

There is a move on foot by the bar of this city, to have this county made a judicial district by itself, and if this can not be done, to have Anderson county added to it, and thus create a new district.

The circuit court of this county is the State's fiscal court and, under law, a large amount of other litigation is required to be originated here, which makes the dockets so heavy that the judge can never hope to catch up in the limited time allowed for the sessions here.

Litigants have a constitutional right to have a speedy trial of their causes of action; and, when it takes a year or so to reach their cases, it becomes a virtual denial of that right.

It is to be hoped that this or some measure may be devised to relieve the congested state of the dockets of this county.

VAGRANTS AND BUMS HAVE TO GET.

Mayor Hume has taken a long step in the right direction when he orders the police to break up the gangs of loafers who obstruct our streets. They will neither work themselves nor let others work if they can help it.
