## NARROW ESCAPE.

Mr. O'Bannon Shields, a relative of Judge J. H. Polsgrove, was driving along the Versailles pike, just out of the city, on Monday, with his wife, in a buggy, when a shot was heard and Mrs. Shields exclaimed that she was shot.

Mr. Shields made a hurried examination and found a bullet in the back of his wife's shirt waist and a slight furrow across the skin of her back, made by the bullet in its course, it evidently being a spent ball.

Upon investigation it was found that a young man, named Noel Robinson, was cleaning a pistol in a back room of a house near by, when the weapon was accidentally discharged cutting a clean hole through the glass of the window and striking Mrs. Shields, as stated above.

Mr. Robinson was unaware of the dangerous accident until informed by Mr. Shields. He deeply regrets the affair.

It was a close call for Mrs. Shields.

## GAINES WINS SUIT.

In the suit of Col. Noel Gaines against the State Journal Co. and Col. W. P. Walton, for libel, in the Anderson Circuit Court, the jury returned a verdict of \$2,000 damages in favor of Gaines, after being out only a short time, on Tuesday morning.

## UNUSUAL MOVE IN COURT OF APPEALS.

It seems that the child was only a few hours old and had been placed in a shoe box and buried in the soft earth on the hillside, and the heavy rains had uncovered the box. It was a white child.

## AFTER EAST TENNESSEE TELEPHONE CO.

City Attorney Wm. Cromwell will file suit in the Circuit Court in the next few days, to compel the East Tennessee Telephone Co. (otherwise known as the Cumberland) to comply with the city ordinance as to rates of telephone rent.

It will be remembered that the Court of Appeals has decided that the City Council had the right to prescribe rates for the rent of telephones.


