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ried on account of being in debt, for they won't pay when they have the money, if there is any possible way to get around it. People who are sensitive about such things, and are worried because they can't pay, would find comfort in the future if they would learn well the very important lesson that one of the worst things they can do is to spend their money before it is earned; that is, to go in debt; buy on credit. Promises to pay are oftentimes full of trouble. The sane and safe way would be to spend less than you make; at least to learn to live within your income. It would be better to deprive yourself of something than to go in debt for it, especially if the prospect of meeting the obligation at the time expected is not very promising."

THE CURSE OF DEBT.

"Now that settling up time has again rolled round, some people who buy on credit are more or less embarrassed to meet their obligations. There are people who are never wor-

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
