

# URGE GOVERNOR

## To Grant Pardons To Jim Howard and Powers.

## Stream Of Letters Pours In From The South.

## Mrs. Willson Also Much Interested In Cases.

### DECISION MAY COME AT ANY TIME.

Streams of letters, from all over the country, are pouring in on Gov. Willson daily, urging him to grant full and free pardons to Caleb Powers and James Howard and every possible pressure is being brought to bear on the Governor to have him pardon both men. The officials, county and State, of many southern States, nearly all of whom are Democrats, have written to Gov. Willson and asked that he pardon the men accused of the murder of William Goebel. During the last few days most of the letters which have been coming have been from the South.

All this has its effect on Gov. Willson, although it is said by his secretary, McKensie Todd, that no man knows how he will decide the cases and he will try not to be influenced by the pleas which have been poured in upon him. The Governor will decide the cases according to the facts as shown by the record, it is stated by him, and he will not let outside influence control him, but it is an impossibility for him not to be influenced in a measure by the constant pleas which are being made for the pardons. All this has its effect, of necessity, and the opinion that he will pardon both men still prevails here.

When the decision will be announced is a problem which no one can solve for the Governor himself does not know. He will not make any prediction, but it is known that he is nearly through with the records and that he has only a few more days of work before he will have read all the evidence in both cases and be familiar with all the facts as brought out at the trials. Mrs. Willson is taking an active interest in the cases and wants Howard pardoned, especially. It was stated here several days ago that the Governor had promised Mrs. Willson to pardon Howard but this was denied officially, and it is said that even Mrs. Willson does not know how the cases will be decided.

While he is waiting for the decision of the Governor and is hoping that he will be pardoned, Howard is doing his regular work in the penitentiary and has made a model prisoner. The warden says he has no fault to find with Howard's conduct. Howard himself, is hopeful and has made his plans for the future in case he is pardoned. He will not say to any one what these plans are, but he says he has no charges to answer if he is freed of the sentence for the alleged murder of Goebel.

## Moses Glenn Gets

### Place As Treasurer.

#### ELECTED TO RESPONSIBLE POSITION BY GRAND LODGE OF A. O. U. W.

Moses R. Glenn, formerly secretary of the Railroad Commission, has been elected treasurer of the A. O. U. W. of Kentucky, and will have his office in Frankfort. He was chosen after a hard fight in the grand lodge, defeating Thomas H. Beard, a banker, of Bowling Green. He was elected to succeed James G. Covington, of Bowling Green, who died last week. Mr. Glenn made a hard fight to secure the next meeting of the Grand Lodge for Frankfort but was defeated by a small vote.

As treasurer of the grand lodge Mr. Glenn will handle between \$75,000 and \$100,000 a year and the position is very responsible. His many friends here will be glad to know that he has been honored with so important and responsible a position and also will be glad to know he can remain in Frankfort.

## Price Taylor Loses

### Suit For Diamond.

#### FORMER FRANKFORT MAN TRIED TO RECOVER RING FROM SWEETHEART.

Price M. Taylor, a cowboy, formerly of Frankfort, failed to recover a \$450 diamond ring from Uucille Mulhall, the cowboy girl, in Justice Spaulding's court at St. Louis. Taylor said he gave Miss Mulhall the ring at her father's ranch in Oklahoma, where they grew to love each other between broncho busting stunts. It was a betrothal present, Taylor said; merely a gift, contended Miss Mulhall. The court agreed with the girl.

Taylor presented the sparkler December 19, 1906, and on February 12, 1907, she wrote him from Minneapolis a chilly letter in which she said:

"When I get to Chicago I will send you what belongs to you and not to me. If you can't write me when I'm on the stage there'll be no writing when I'm off."

Taylor wired back: "Don't wait until you get to Chicago. Send what you have of mine now."

"I sent him his letters and photographs," she testified today, "after I received that telegram."

"But you didn't send him the diamond ring," observed Attorney Chesney.

"I sent him what was his, not what was mine," she responded, calmly. "The diamond ring was mine; he gave it to me."

## Will Have Walk Over For Secretaryship.

#### A. S. BENNETT WILL NOT HAVE OPPOSITION FOR REPUBLICAN COMMITTEE JOB.

Opposition to A. S. Bennett, as secretary of the Republican State committee has blown up and it is practically certain that when the State committee meets to select a secretary, Mr. Bennett will be chosen by practically unanimous vote of the committee. Samuel Young, of Glasgow, who, it is said, wants to get into politics in the State, has been a candidate for the place as secretary, but it is generally conceded now that he will not have sufficient following to cut much figure in the race for secretary.

Mr. Bennett was in Frankfort on Thursday and said that he had enough votes pledged to give him the place. He is a candidate for re-election and his record has been so good that the Republicans over the State want him to stay in the position of secretary.

## Woodford Man Gets

### Carnegie Hero Money.

#### SAVED LIFE OF NEGRO WHO WAS ATTACKED BY MAD BULL—DOG REAL RESCUER.

Clifford V. Graves, of Versailles, Woodford county, has been awarded a bronze medal and \$700 with which to pay his debts, by the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission. The feat of Graves was that of saving a man from a mad bull. On March 7, 1907, Graves, who is a farmer, saw a 3-year-old Jersey bull knock down and trample Meritt Brown, a colored man, and with no weapon save a pocketknife with a four-inch blade he attacked the bull, which also knocked him down and would have killed him with Brown but for the arrival of Graves' dog, which attacked the bull so viciously that the animal turned its attention to the dog, allowing both Brown and Graves to escape.

## Night Rider Raid

### Victims Will Sue.

#### ACTIONS TO BE FILED IN FEDERAL COURT BY FORMER BRACKEN COUNTY MEN.

Many civil suits for damages against alleged night riders are soon to be filed in the United States District Court of Kentucky by former residents of Bracken county, who have been driven out of this State as the result of the bands of lawless men who have been operating in Bracken county. Many families have been driven from Kentucky where they have acquired property and they will sue in the Federal court, following the example set by Robert Hallowell, who sued at Paducah. It is believed that in this way much can be done to break up the night riders in Bracken and other counties adjacent.

In addition to these suits it is expected that numerous arrests will be made in Bracken county this week. Gen. Roger Williams has gone to Bracken county and is now in command of the State troops there. Col. E. W. Lillard, who has been in command of the State troops there, will remain in active service in Bracken, but the soldiers will be under the direct control of Gen. Williams, who is the ranking officer.

## To Inspect Companies

### In The State Guard.

#### CAPT. W. N. HUGHES WILL GO OUT ABOUT JUNE 1, FOR TRIP OVER STATE.

Capt. W. N. Hughes, the regular army officer who is stationed in Kentucky to assist the Adjutant General's department in the reorganization of the State Guard, will start about June 1 on his annual inspection trip and will inspect all the companies in the State. He will be accompanied by an officer of the militia, and they will see in just what condition the State Guard of Kentucky now is. Capt. Hughes will make his inspection rigid, being a stricker for regularity and the various companies of the three regiments are prepared for a severe inspection. They hope to be able to make a good showing and are preparing to present themselves in a first-class condition.
