AT HOME.

Mr. A. R. Ross, a prominent business man of Cincinnati, was foully murdered by unknown parties near his home, at Glendale, Ohio, on the night of the 7th.

George Huntington, his wife and four children were capsized in a sail boat in Plum Island River, near Amesbury, Mass., and all drowned.

It is believed that the murderers of Mr. R. W. Ross, near Glendale, Ohio, will soon be brought to justice.

The competitive drill between St. Bernard Commandery of Knights Templar, of Chicago, and Raper Commandery, of Indianapolis, Ind., for possession of the prize drill banner awarded by the triennial convocation of 1880, and lately won by St. Bernard from Raper, occurred at Chicago on the 9th.

Mr. James Hay Smith, a prominent business man of Chicago, was found dead in the lake near that city, on the 7th. The circumstances of his death are shrouded in mystery.

At a baptizing near Canton, Ga., recently, a bridge fell into the river and precipitated 200 persons into the water.

At Waupaca, Wisconsin, on the night of the 8th, H. C. Mead, a wealthy banker, was murdered in his room and robbed of several thousand dollars in currency, gold and bonds.

The telegraphic communication between the United States and South America is thus effected: The cables of the Mexican Telegraph Company, starting from Galveston, reach Vera Cruz via Tampico, at which point the cables of the Central and South American Telegraph Company extend to the Islands of Tehuantepec, thence by land lines to the Pacific, thence by cables to Lima, in Peru, where they connect with the cables of the West Coast Telegraph Company now laid to Valparaiso, Chili.

It is claimed that it is not a political organization, although the influence of the Alliance is used to assist in the election of candidates pledged to anti-monopoly, regardless of party affiliation.
