Doings At Frankfort.

The silverites, gold Democrats and anti-Hunter Republicans broke a quorum Saturday in the daily Senatorial squabble and only fifty-eight votes were cast—all for Hunter. Representative Thompson declared he would not again vote for Hunter until the bribery charges were cleared up.

A furore of excitement was caused Saturday by the grand jury investigating charges of bribery brought against Dr. Hunter, John E. Wilson and E. T. Franks. Thos. Tanner testified that at Hunter's request he took him (Hunter) to the house of Capt. Noel Gaines one night and Gaines testified that Dr. Hunter offered him \$15,000 to get three Legislators to vote for him for Senator. Dr. Hunter denies that he knows or ever saw either Tanner or Gaines, and says he never was in their house. Wilson and Franks also deny the accusation. Capt. Gaines is one of the best known young men in Frankfort, and is captain of the McCreary guards. The indictments were drawn up Saturday but have not yet been filed.

The House Saturday passed the bill requiring that all death sentences imposed by the Kentucky courts should be carried out within the walls of the Frankfort penitentiary. It is thought the bill will also pass the Senate.
