An Interesting Jumble Of News And Comment.

Rev. Geo. O. Barnes' former residence, the celebrated "Pink Cottage," was sold this week for \$1,500 cash.

The annual convention of the Christian churches of Kentucky will be held at Louisville June 22nd, and 23d and 24th.

Cynthiana young people are enjoying pleasant trips on Licking in a steam launch owned by J. W. Megibben.

Twelve-year-old Susie Reeves jumped the rope 265 times Monday at Louisville and died Thursday. Parents should caution children from over-exertion in this amusement.

On the 21st, Rev. George O. Barnes and Miss Marie will leave Sanibel Island, Fla., to resume their labor of love. That date is Bro Barnes' 70th birthday and the 21st anniversary of his evangel.

The punishment of Arthur A. Platt for the murder of Jesse Tyree at the Eastern Kentucky Insane Asylum, 12 years ago, was fixed by the Jury Sunday morning at four years in the penitentiary. The jury had been out since 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Platt's attorneys say they will appeal the case.

The Turnpike Question.

AN exchange says: "The commissioners appointed in Woodford county to appraise the value of the turnpikes condemned by the County Court have reported that they are worth \$1 each. It may be said that the appraisers were in sympathy with the mobs, but it may also be taken as a plain proposition that a pike on which no collection of toll is permitted is not worth anything as revenue-producing property."

In Woodford county last week appraisers fixed the value of the Lexington & Frankfort road, 6 1/2 miles, the Mortonsville & Lexington road, 3 miles, and the Versailles pike, 3 miles, at \$1 each.

A mob composed of fifteen armed men destroyed four tollgates in Bath county Thursday night, and made the usual threats to the keepers.

The Anderson county grand jury Friday indicted six tollgate raiders, and they were arrested and jailed. Their bonds were each placed at \$1,000. Other arrests will be made. One of the men indicted is worth \$10,000.

Frankfort Doings.

Only one vote was cast for each candidate for Senator yesterday.

It was given out yesterday at Hunter headquarters that Hunter will withdraw to-day. A prominent Republican leader said: "A Senator will be elected at this session and he will be either Martin or a Republican whose nomination Dr. Hunter will of course dictate."

Hon. W. J. Bryan spoke to a large audience yesterday at the Frankfort opera house, by invitation of the Legislature.

The Legislature has been in session thirty-four legislative days, the session being four days more than half over, and there have been but two bills passed and signed by the Governor.

Just 105 bills have been introduced in the House, with about half as many in the Senate.

Suits have been filed by the banks of Louisville, asking that the State be restrained from collecting taxes from them under the recent decision of the Court of Appeals. All the banks and trust companies in the city except the Bank of Kentucky and the Bank of Louisville are plaintiffs in the suits.

In the House the bill reducing the salary of the Assistant Adjutant General to \$1 per annum was killed.

The effort to elect a United States Senator in Kentucky has cost up to this time about \$80,000. It is absorbing almost the entire attention of the Legislature at this session as at the last to the almost complete exclusion of important matters of legislation.

The House at Frankfort passed a bill amending fourth-class city charters to allow additional taxes for school purposes.

The anti-egg throwing bill has been signed by Gov. Bradley.

The Franklin county grand jury returned indictments against Dr. Hunter, J. H. Wilson, E. T. Franks, Noel Gaines and Brother-in-law Tanner charging them with conspiracy to bribe members of the Legislature. The indictment for perjury against Dr. Hunter is still pending.

The first race Friday at Newport was won handily by Duncan Bell, a black colt by Hindoo—Miss Used, owned by Clay Bros., of Runnymede Stock Farm. The colt Macy, that Clay Bros. sold last Fall won a good race the same day at Memphis.


