The State Convention At Frankfort.

THE State Convention called to nominate a Democratic candidate for Appellate Clerk convened Wednesday at Frankfort.

Mr. Goebel was elected temporary chairman, and in due time the committee on permanent organization made the following report, which was adopted: Permanent chairman, George S. Fulton, of Nelson; permanent secretary, James E. Stone, of Breckinridge; assistant secretaries, Green R. Keller, of Nicholas, and W. P. Swope, of Owen; servant-at-arms, C. E. Sommers, of Hardin, and Robert Tyler, of Bullitt.

Two ballots were taken at the Wednesday night session, which were substantially the same. The second ballot resulted:

The convention adjourned at 12 o'clock midnight until Thursday morning. Maj. P. P. Johnston was retained as chairman of the State Central and Executive Committee.

Speeches were made by Joe Blackburn, Wat Hardin, William Goebel, B. A. Enloe, Chas. Bronston, George Fulton, James McCreery, and others.

The platform adopted reaffirms the Chicago platform, condemns the Republican State Administration; recommends legislation to prevent competition of convict labor with free labor, "remember with pride the heroic efforts" of Mr. Blackburn for re-election, and commends those who defeated the bill to revise the election laws—meaning the fusion bill, etc.

Shackelford was nominated on the 10th ballot, receiving 558 votes to Green's 535. Blackburn, Hardin, Bronston and Goebel supported Green and Ford, the defeated candidates.

AN itinerant band enlivened Main street considerably yesterday afternoon with popular airs—and collections.

PRESIDENT MCKINLEY will pass through Lexington next Friday over the C. & O. en route to the Nashville Centennial.

Rev. Fife, the drummer evangelist, is holding a revival at Frankfort.

Nicholasville thieves stole ex-Senator Sparks' tan shoes and his Bradley hat.

Henry Hogan killed himself at Nashville, on account of the cigarette habit.

Danville has a literary society called "The Altruists," with twenty-six active members.

The farmers near Columbus, Ky., have made a net profit of \$28,240 this year from raising strawberries.

Wesley Donahue, 13, fell from a ladder Tuesday at Louisville. He was uninjured but his hair turned perfectly gray.

Mrs. Eliza Vaughan, of Laurel county, shot and killed her son-in-law, Cortez Brown, who had driven his wife from home, and had gone to his mother-in-law's to raise a racket.

A mule reputed to be 37 years old died on James Coons' farm, near Muir's Station, Monday. The animal went through the war with General John Morgan's command, and was in the famous Ohio raid.

Earthquake shocks were felt Monday at Cincinnati, Knoxville, Norfolk, Va., Savannah, Ga., and other Southern cities. Louisville, Maysville, Butler, Pineville, Greenup, Catlettsburg, Vanceburg and other points in Kentucky also felt the seismic disturbance.

Editor Geo. Henry, of the Falmouth Guide, has a dog which is as difficult to lose as a bad coin or a cat. Last week, for the 'steenth time, he gave it away to a rural friend—probably as a premium for back subscription—but the pup came back the very next day, just like the cat in the song.

The case against Newton Lane, under indictment No. 2 for killing James Rodenbaugh in August, 1895, was called Tuesday in the Woodford Circuit Court and on motion of the Commonwealth's Attorney the indictment was ordered filed away. Lane was recently acquitted of the charge of murder for killing Colonel H. C. Rodenbaugh.

Judge Cantrill will hold a special term of court at Frankfort Monday at which a decision will be handed down on the demurrer to the indictments against Hunter, Franks and others; the Southern Pacific case, and the mandamus suit of Judge Watts Parker, of Lexington, to compel Auditor Stone to issue \$3,500 duplicate State warrants, the original of which was destroyed in the Fayette County court house fire.

Kentucky's Belligerent Citizens.

The raiders appear to be secure in Robertson county and have ordered the removal of tollgates on the Milford and Falmouth turnpike. The County Judge of Robertson county denies in a newspaper card that he has offered a reward of \$500 for the arrest of turnpike raiders.

The troops have been withdrawn from Owingsville. Judge Gudgell may have to pay with his political life for his activity against the raiders. He is a Republican candidate for Circuit Judge, but the raiders and their friends, irrespective of political lines, are fighting him.

More requests have been received by Gov. Bradley from County Judges to offer rewards for turnpike raiders.

Sales and Transfers of Stock, Crop, Etc.—Turf Notes.

Jack Chinn is now starter at Latonia. Linville Marders' colt Robinson won a \$300 purse Monday at Latonia.

Auditor S. A. Stone sold his farm of 559 1/2 acres in Madison, Wednesday, to Col. S. W. Caperton, of Richmond, for \$46,145.

Turney Bros.' speedy colt Tillo, winner of the Decoration Day Handicap, will be a starter in the Ripple Stakes tomorrow.

The sixth race at Latonia Tuesday, was won by J. K. Redmon's chestnut colt Serrano, Talbot Bros.' Lufra second. The purse was \$300.

At a recent sale in Philadelphia Wawona, 2:19 1/2, by Bourbon Wilkes, was sold for \$1,000, and Msj. Flowers, another Bourbon bred horse, sold to a local buyer for \$600.

Several horses belonging to C. W. Donnell of Carlisle, Ky., were sold at auction in the American Horse Exchange Tuesday afternoon. The best price was for Rara Avis, who was sold to J. F. Gibson for \$1,050.

Richard Croker's horse, Americus, won the Riddledown plate of 200 sovereigns at the third day's racing of Epsom spring meeting yesterday in England. This is the third race he has won in thirty days.
