C. & O. Penellings.

Persons who have not ridden over that splendid road, the C. & O., have missed bits of mountain scenery that are seldom equaled in the South in point of picturesque beauty. Just now the trees on the mountains are showing a thousand gorgeous Autumnal tints, and here and there the winding roads are fringed with fields of beautiful goldenrod. In a half a hundred places the mountain side is marked with coal mines, and a score of times the F. F. V. dashes through busy, thriving lumber camps before it passes from Kentucky into West Virginia, leaving the crowd of mountain-folk which gathers at every station, watching the train as it flies Eastward. Other natural curiosities which attract the attention of the tourist are the huge boulders, many of them larger than a two-story house, which seem to rest so lightly on the mountain-side that a child might start them crushing downward, carrying destruction in their wake.

The whistle of the engine and the clanging of the bell always bring from three to five tow-headed youngsters to the door of the humble homes which dot the mountain and the valley. The over supply of tots at every home prompted a lady passenger to ask "don't they raise any crops except children here?" It appears to be too true in some places. Another noticeable feature peculiar to the mountains is that Friday is selected for the regular washday instead of Monday. On every line hang red dresses of all sizes, from baby's to mother's. The mountain-folk are true to it. In general they are a contented lot, because their desires are few and their habits simple, with never a thought of fashion, society or politics to trouble them.

Ashtand, the Eastern terminus of the Lexington division of the C. & O., is a beautiful city of about 8,000. It has water works, electric lights, public parks, fine hotels, a trolley line, four railroads, steam-boat traffic, a steel plant, a tannery, a furniture factory, iron furnaces and a nail mill, giving employment to hundreds of men. The mills are running and better times are smiling on Ashtand. The fact that Catlettsburg and nearly a dozen smaller towns are located on a line between Ashtand and Huntington (W. Va.) has given voice to the prediction that a future generation may see them merged by the march of progress into one great city.
