Guards For Baldwin's Gates.

Tuesday at Maysville, Col. W. W. Baldwin, the "Turnpike King," made application to Circuit Court Judge Jas. P. Harbeston for ten men to guard the five gates in Mason county. The Judge immediately ordered the Sheriff to summon the men, which was done Wednesday morning. The men were furnished Winchester rifles and ordered to protect the gates at any cost.

Col. Baldwin had Governor Bradley's word for it that if the guards were not furnished by the court the Governor would send the militia into Mason county in twenty-four hours after the refusal of the court.

Col. Baldwin Wednesday sold eight miles of his Maysville & Lexington pike in the Fayette Fiscal Court at \$1,863 per mile.

The Government's receipts for November were \$3,092,493 less than its expenditures. The Treasury deficit for the five months of the current fiscal year is \$46,101,494.

Insurgents are again active in Cuba and the Spanish troops have been engaged in several skirmishes. In ten days, according to official reports, the Spanish have lost 109 men killed and wounded, while the insurgent loss was only fifty-four.

The Lexington Gazette says: "Wheat went up in Chicago Friday to \$1 per bushel and closed at 99 1/2 cents. It closed on Wednesday 95 cents and this rise of 4 cents is phenomenal and show that European buyers are anxious. We have had an abiding faith that wheat would go to \$1.25 before Christmas and \$1.50 by next harvest."



Christmas Bees For Englishmen.

DURING the past few days Moses Kahn has shipped twenty-nine cars of fine Christmas bees from this city to England. The cattle, which were prepared for the market by Bourbon farmers, weighed about 1,500 each, and cost from \$4.25 to \$4.75 per cwt.

Jonas Weil has shipped to England eighteen cars of Christmas bees selected from Mr. C. Alexander's herd. This is Weil's third shipment from this herd, there being 503 in the entire consignment. Two cars of 1,775-lb. cattle bought from Wm. Bedford and Mrs. Thos. Wornall were also shipped with this lot. Weil has also shipped seven cars from Lexington, two from Richmond and five from Chilesburg.

J. C. Turley has exported seven 1,600-pound cattle from Mt. Sterling to England.

From Richmond two cattle weighing 4,470 pounds were shipped to London.

Moses Kahn has this week made the following purchases of export cattle in the Millersburg precinct: From W. M. Layson sixteen 1,800-pounders, at \$4.75; from Robt. Thompson thirty-eight 1,700-pounders, at \$4.60; from Robt. Farr twelve 1,500-pounders, at \$4.35; from Jos. Hunter ten 1,500-pounders, at \$4.35.




