Democratic Convention Called.

The Democratic Committee of the Seventh District met yesterday at Frankfort and decided to hold the District Congressional Convention at Frankfort, on November 30th, Thanksgiving Day.

In the district convention Fayette county will have 20 votes, Bourbon 11, Woodford 8, Scott 11, Franklin 12, Owen 17, Henry 11 and Oldham 5.

The Republican Committee will meet at Lexington Tuesday to select a candidate.

Bourbon Men Decline.

Hon. J. T. Hinton, Bourbon's Representative in the Kentucky Legislature, who was called upon Tuesday's BOURBON NEWS to become a candidate for Congress to succeed the late Hon. E. E. Settle, has decided not to make the race.

Hon. W. H. McMillan, of this city, who was called upon in Wednesday's Kentuckian-Citizen to permit the use of his name as a candidate to succeed the late Congressman Settle as Representative from the "Ashland District," has decided not to become a candidate for the nomination.

James H. Settle, brother of the late Congressman Settle, has announced as a candidate for Congress, and June Gayle, also of Owen, is an announced candidate for the office.

Judge Mulligan and Hon. John R. Allen, of Lexington, have announced for the office, and Franklin county will have two candidates in Judge Ira Julian and Judge Ben Williams.

Hon. Claude M. Thomas, a sterling young Democrat of this city, who was Consul to Marseilles during President Cleveland's administration, has been most favorably mentioned as a candidate for Congress.
