News and Comment of Stage Matters and Other Gossip.

The average weekly receipts of "Ben Hur" and "Zaza" are \$16,000.

It is possible that the Grand may have a new manager next season in the person of Robert S. Porter, of this city.

Lexington and Mt. Sterling theatregoers will have the pleasure of seeing that beautiful play "Shore Acres", this week. Paris will be inflicted with "Uncle Tom's Cabin".

A small audience saw the farce "Two Merry Tramps" produced Saturday night at the Grand. The play did not receive a very cordial reception and a number of persons left before the play was half over. The piece had several bright spots in it but they did not save it from being tiresome. The company is resting this week in Cincinnati.

"In Old Kentucky" seems to have a remarkable hold on the theatre-going public. After playing to a large business in Pittsburg, winding up with a \$1,400 house on Saturday night, the play has been taken to New York for an engagement at the Grand opera house. Laura Burt is still in the cast. The play has made Charles T. Dazey, a former Parisian, a rich man.

Joseph Jefferson will appear at the Lexington opera house on April 6th, and an effort is being made to have him present "Rip Van Winkle." Among Manager Scott's other important bookings are "The Christian," matinee and night, March 3; Hoyt's "A Black Sheep," early in March; "Heart of Maryland," made famous by Mrs. Leslie Carter, March 14; "White Horse Tavern," about the middle of March, and Lewis Morrison, April 11.

The receipts for the recent matinee recital given by Paderewski in Cincinnati were \$1,400, of which sum the famous pianist received \$2,500 for a single afternoon's work. Paderewski is a tall, slender man, with blue eyes and long blonde hair, and has exceptionally long fingers, and has arms endowed with the muscle of a blacksmith. He speaks English and is an agreeable gentleman. He uses the Steinway piano exclusively in his concerts.
