Representative Smith, of Kentucky, yesterday introduced in the House bills for public buildings at Lebanon and Bardstown.

The remains of Samuel Anderson, of Mt. Sterling, who died in the Army service at Manila, were brought home this week for burial.

A Fleming county Democrat has announced himself a candidate for the office of Jailor for the term beginning in January, 1900.

Mrs. Jacob Seib, of near Versailles, has a duck which has been laying Easter eggs for a week. One egg is black and the others are a dark gray.

Sonza's band will give two concerts Sunday at the Music Hall, in Cincinnati.

A Society Minstrel Show will be given in Maysville on March 29th at the new opera house.

Lewis Morrison's private car, which originally belonged to Mrs. Langtry, was destroyed by fire recently and all Mrs. Morrison's jewelry was destroyed.

The attractions in Cincinnati theatres next week will be: Grand, W. H. Crane in "A Rich Man's Son," and "A Virginia Courtship;" Pike, "Othello;" Walnut, "The Sorrows of Satan."

The famous Zangwill play "The Children of The Ghetto" will be presented to-night and to-morrow night with Saturday matinee at the Lexington opera house. The company is headed by Wilton Lackaye, and is one of the best organizations out this season. Several Parisians will go up to the matinee.

Is a dappled gray horse, foaled Oct. 20, 1892; bred by Jacob P. Sleight, of Lansing, Mich.; stands 16 1/4 hands high, and weighs 1760 pounds. This is the only purely-bred and registered Percheron stallion ever offered to the public in Kentucky. He came from the Oaklawn Farms, owned by M. W. Dunkam, of Wayne, Ill., the largest breeder of Percheron and French Coach horses in the world and the owner of more prize-winners than any other breeder in France or America.

This horse has been shown only three times, winning first prize in each event and in one of them there were eight other entries of different draft breeds.
