Col. James Robert Estill, brother of Maj. J. T. Estill, of Madison, died at his home "Estill," Howard county, Mo., March 1. Col. Estill was a grand-son of Capt. James Estill, of historic fame. He was also a grandson of Col. Robert Rodes, a noted financier of Madison County. He accumulated a magnificent fortune, being one of the wealthiest men of Missouri. He was a remarkably genial, handsome, brainy man and stood long and high as a leader in the Christian Church. He was prominently interested in the State Orphan School for girls at Fulton, Mo., a man of great philanthropy, and his death is regarded as a public calamity.
