Mr. and Mrs. Nat Goodwin played to \$36,000 in three weeks recently in Philadelphia, playing only "When We Were Twenty-one." They will sail on July 4th for England to remain at their country seat until they return to America in October.

Sterling performance the *Sentinel-Democrat* says that the scenery was awful and each one of the actors seemed to be worse than the other. The *Democrat* says that there were but eight people in the cast at Cythiana, and that the bull was the only comedian in the show. He wore a buffalo robe, a pair of horns and two pairs of tan shoes, and was an easy argument for Ursus. The opinion given several months ago by THE NEWS regarding the company was not far from wrong.
