In Trimble's Favor.

FRANKFORT, KY., Oct. 10.—Chief Justice Hazelrigg handed down an opinion in the Court of Appeals this morning affirming the judgment of the Franklin Circuit Court declaring the Hon. South Trimble, of this county to be the regular Democratic nominee for Congress in this, the Seventh Congressional District. The case was decided by Judge Cantrill at the September term of the Franklin Court.

The case was an agreed one filed by **W. H. Moody**, of Henry county, the nominee of the Paris convention.

Facts About Trusts.

THE facts are that in the last two years of the McKinley administration there have been created 700 or 800 trusts in the United States, representing a capitalization of \$5,000,000,000. McKinley's Attorney-General has made no attempt to enforce the anti-trust law, and these 700 or 800 trusts have flourished with the connivance, aid and support of the McKinley administration. These trusts are now contributing of their millions to re-elect their friend and supporter. The Republican Dingie (man) is one of the chief promoters of the trusts.—[Pittsburg Post.]

Ex-President Harrison has declined to make any speeches for McKinley.

Mark Hanna's Franklin iron furnace and Clinton iron ore mines have been ordered shut down. Four hundred men are thrown out of work.

Mr. Bryan made sixteen speeches Tuesday in Illinois, addressing large crowds. On Wednesday he spoke at various points in Michigan.

The Democrats of Scott county are arranging to give a mammoth barbecue near Georgetown about Oct. 25. They are endeavoring to get Hon. Bourke Cochran to make a speech, and will make preparations to feed five thousand people.

Mr. Bryan had a day of fine weather in Michigan Wednesday and was greeted by a succession of good crowds. Open air meetings were the rule, and sixteen speeches were made during the day. Two speeches were delivered at Grand Rapids, where the day's tour was closed.


