**Political Topics.**

Governor Beckham will speak tomorrow afternoon at Ewing station, and will speak at Maysville in the evening.

Rain fell everywhere Mr. Bryan spoke Tuesday, but thousands stood out in the downpour and cheered his speeches.

Hon. W. J. Bryan will speak in Cincinnati on Oct. 31st at Music Hall.

Hon. John W. Keller addressed a large crowd Tuesday at Mt. Sterling, and had another fine audience Wednesday at Winchester.

Now that a new election law has been passed Hon. Chas. Bronston has come out heartily for Gov. Beckham and will make a speech in his interest this afternoon at the Lexington opera house.

Fifteen hundred persons participated in the Democratic horseback parade at Eminence.

Gov. Beckham spoke in the rain at Hardinsburg Tuesday afternoon to a large crowd. The crowd was too large to get in the warehouse, in which the speaking was to have taken place, and the Governor was forced to go outside. Gov. Beckham spoke at night at Cloverport to another large audience.

Mr. Bryan made nineteen speeches Wednesday in Maryland and Delaware, making two lengthy speeches at night in Wilmington. Mr. Bryan varied his subjects to suit his audiences, speaking of the race question, the trusts, silver and imperialism, and impressed upon his Delaware auditors the importance of the election to them, since Delaware is also to elect two Senators this year.

**Ballot Boxes Too Small**

County Clerk Smith, of Franklin county, made a test of the ballot boxes in Franklin county, and finds that those in use heretofore will not be available for use in large precincts, and that, as a result, serious complications are likely to occur in many counties at the coming election. The new law requires that the ballots be placed in the box and preserved, and Mr. Smith says the average boxes will not hold the ballots where 800 or more are cast in one precinct.


