#### KENTUCKY'S POPULATION.

The population of Kentucky, by counties, has been announced by the Census Bureau. The population for the entire State is 2,147,174, and increase of 15.5 per cent. since 1890, when the population was 1,858,635. The increase from 1880 to 1890 was 12.7 per cent.

Bourbon county has increased from 16,976 to 18,069, a gain of 1,093 in ten years. Paris has increased from 4,218 to 4,603.

The latter figure is very disappointing but the census of Paris will always appear incorrect unless it is remembered that the city limits are so situated as to cut out several hundred in the suburbs of Ruckerville and as many more in Claysville. These added would bring the total up to a much larger figure.

The 1900 census gives Cynthiana 3,257, Frankfort 9,487, Georgetown 3,823, Maysville 6,433, Mt. Sterling 3,561, Richmond 4,633, Winchester 5,594.

Because of the city boundaries above alluded to it makes Paris appear a smaller place than some of the neighbor cities which really have not so many inhabitants in its immediate vicinity as has Paris.

There are now in Kentucky 2,147,174 people. In 1890 the population was 1,858,635. In the past decade Kentucky has enjoyed greater prosperity than in the decade preceding. In 1880 the population was 1,648,690. In the next ten years it increased 203,945, or 12.7 per cent.
