## Stock and Crop.

J. B. Haggin, of Fayette county, is reported to have 600 acres of corn that will average fifteen barrels to the acre.

James L. Dodge, of Paris, will start his Allerton filly in the pacing stake at Terre Haute. She has shown well in her work.

Ben V. Jones sold Wednesday to Capt. Foster, of St. Simon, Ga., a pair of black harness mares, for \$800.—Winchester Democrat.

The Abbott made a trial mile at Terre Haute Saturday in 2:05, going the last half mile in one minute flat. On Thursday at the Belmont track he trotted a mile in 2:04½.

John M. Johnson sold this week to Dr. J. W. Johnson his farm of about sixty acres on the Colby pike and near the city limits at \$112.50 per acre.—Winchester Democrat.

Hogs went as high as \$7.30 per 100 pounds in Chicago last week and this week 7½ cents for the best. Only twice in sixteen years have prices been so high, but in 1893 hogs were forced up to \$8.75, while lard went over \$13 and ribs over \$10. Hogs are now selling much higher than cattle and almost the price (by pounds) for sheep.

Clay Brothers of this city have been exceptionally unfortunate in the past few weeks. Last week Sir Oliver, one of the most promising two-year-olds on the American turf, for which they had only recently refused \$15,000, died suddenly at Gravesend. Driscoll, for which they were offered \$7,000 since the Spring meeting at Louisville, also died recently.

In the matinee of the Road Drivers' Association at the Empire City track Saturday, Billings' brown pacer, Little Boy, broke the world's record. Accompanied by a runner and driven by an amateur reinsman, F. G. Jones, of Memphis, in an effort to break his own record of 2:03¾ to wagon, Little Boy went the quarter in 31, half in 1:00¾, three-quarters in 1:31, and passed the wire in 2:02.
