

SIMMS—ALEXANDER.

The marriage of Miss Lucy Fullerton Alexander and Mr. William Erskine Simms was celebrated Saturday at high noon at Woodburn House, in Woodford county, the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alexander John Alexander. Rev. G. H. Rout, of the Versailles Presbyterian Church, officiated, and Mr. Graham, of Frankfort, the bride's old teacher, played the music for the marriage service.

It was a beautiful wedding and a notable event in the social history of the State as the bride and groom are both from its most prominent and wealthy families.

The scene of the marriage was the picturesque music room, which was decorated with green and white with palms, ferns, bride roses and carnations. The bridesmaids were Misses Nannie and Susanne Waller, of Chicago, Katherine Lindsay, of Frankfort, and Lucy Simms, of Paris, the groom's sister. A cousin of the house, Mrs. Jesse Watkins, of Chicago, was dame of honor.

The bride entered with her father and the groom was accompanied by the best man, his brother, Mr. Edward Simms, of Paris. The bride's gown was one of extreme richness and very becoming to the dainty beauty of the wearer. It was entirely of white point lace applied on chiffon and over heavy white satin. It was garnished with lillies of the valley and the veil of tulle was caught in the hair with diamonds and pearls. She carried a bouquet of lillies of the valley and sweet violets.

The groomsmen were Messrs. James Stillwell, of Chicago, Ford Brent, of Paris, Frank T. Justice, of Lexington, and Alex. Alexander, brother of the bride.

After the wedding the happy couple left for their wedding journey and on their return will make their home in Lexington, having leased one of the new residences on Second street next to the Woman's Club.

The Leader says: "The groom is a prominent business man and graduate of Yale College, and will be welcomed with pleasure in business circles and with his charming wife by everybody in Lexington. He is the son of Mrs. W. E. Simms, of Paris, and his father was the late Captain Simms, a distinguished lawyer of Bourbon county, and a member of the Confederate Congress."

A large number of guests attended the wedding from Paris, Lexington, Louisville and the near-by towns.

The engagement of Mr. William Hargis Walker, of Lockhart, Texas, and Miss Nancy Elizabeth Brashear, of Hardin county, is announced. The wedding will occur on the twentieth of November. Miss Brashear is one of the most beautiful young girls of Hardin county, and is a descendant on both sides of the family of two of the oldest and most prominent families of the State. Hon. J. D. Guthrie, legislator for many years, was the grandfather of Miss Brashear. Ex-Governor Robert Wickliffe, of Louisiana; ex-Governor Chariss A. Wickliffe, of Kentucky, and ex-Governor John Porter, of Tennessee, were all uncles of Miss Brashear's parents. Mr. Walker was formerly a resident of Louisville, and is a nephew of Judge Hargis, of that place, but is now a prominent railroad official of Lockhart, Texas. The wedding will be at the home of the bride's brother, J. A. Brashear, at West Point, and will be very quiet on account of the bride's family being in mourning. Miss Brashear has spent much of her time in Bourbon since the death of her father, with her sisters, Mrs. Robert S. Thompson and Mrs. J. Curtis Lary, and has many
