INSPECTION INVITED.

Gov. Bryan Dead.

Hon. Jamef W. Bryan, ex-Lieutenant Governor of Kentucky under the Buckner administration, died of pneumonia on Wednesday morning at his home in Covington. Gov. Bryan was born at Millersburg, June 9, 1853, was valedictorian of the class of 1873 at the Kentucky Wesleyan College, commenced the practice of law at Covington in 1875, was Democratic elector in 1880 and as messenger bore the electoral college of Kentucky to Washington for Hancock and English. In 1885 without opposition he was elected State Senator from Kenton county. In 1887 he was unanimously nominated for the office of Lieutenant Governor and elected, with a vote largely in excess of that of any candidate on the ticket. In 1891 he retired from politics and has since enjoyed a large practice in the State and Federal court of Kentucky and Ohio.

Gov. Bryan's parents, Lawrence and Katherin Power Bryan, deceased, were both born in Ireland. In 1889 he married Miss Virginia Martin, of Owen county, and to this union two daughters were born, Misses Mattie and Catherine Bryan. Besides these he leaves one brother, Hon. M. T. Bryan a leading lawyer of Nashville, and one sister, Mrs. Thomas Milam, of Centerville, this county. A younger sister, Mrs. Nora Campbell, died a few weeks ago at Nashville.

Governor Bryan, was loved and honored by the people of his native county, who are saddened by the announcement of his death.
