MUST BE VACCINATED.—In Maysville the Board of Health created a sensation by serving notices on all citizens that unless they can show certificates of vaccination for every member of their families or allow physicians who will call to vaccinate all who have not been vaccinated in the last five years, their houses will be subject to fine or imprisonment. Twenty-four hours is given in which to comply with the order.

OIL FIELDS.—From January 31, 1902, to April 1, 1902, 1,790 leases were corded in the office of the County Clerk of Knox county. The fee on leases average \$2 each. The cost of recording these leases has amounted to over \$3,000. For each lease the State receives fifty cents.

—E. W. Lees sold a bunch of hogs to J. C. Johnson at 6 1-2c.

—Some of the best mares in Kentucky have been booked to Baron, Wilkes, Jr.

—R. A. Harris, of Richmond, sold to Newland Jones 22 125-lb. shoats at 7 cents.

—Hibler Bros. shipped a car load of hogs to Cincinnati, this week, that cost \$6.65 at home.

—John Spohn, of Harrison, bought of Thos. Prather, of this county, 21 1,000-lb. heifers at 5 cents.

—A shipment of 2,000 head of cattle for South Africa will be made from Galveston, Texas, as an experiment.

—Wm. Cloyd sold to Fox & Logan a pair of mules for \$340 and 1 to M. B. Fubanks for \$110.—Interior Journal.

—Nearly 1,900 horses are quartered at Louisville, waiting for the saddling bell to ring on Derby Day, Saturday, May 2.

—At Carlisle, Monday, 60 Polled Angus cattle averaged about \$75. J. H. Thompson, purchased a yearling bull for \$75.

—The Armour, of Chicago, have already contracted for 3,000,000 bushels of July wheat at 76 1-2 cents, which makes the outlook most encouraging for the farmer.

—Since Jan. 1, Mrs. W. H. Garnett, of Sadleville, has sold from two cows, 101 pounds of butter and 98 gallons of milk, besides what the family used.—Georgetown News.

—Another class has been added to the cattle exhibit list of the State Fair. It is for one bull and four cows belonging to the same person. The prize is a silver cup offered by Gov. Beckham.

—Clarence Kerr shipped yesterday a car load of saddle horses from Lexington to Dr. Smith, of Cumberland, Md. He bought a Bracken Chief mare at Cynthiana, and one of Luncie Talbot.
