BLAST

Fatally Hurt One and Dangerously Wounded Two Men, Wednesday.

While engaged in blasting surfacing rock for the Paris-Lexington interurban electric line at Hedges and Adair's quarry, one mile south of this city, Wednesday afternoon, James Boyle, white, and two colored men named George Smith and Aaron Norris were seriously injured by the explosion of a charge of giant powder.

Boyle's right leg was broken below the knee, both eyes injured and his face badly burned. Smith sustained severe bruises on the chest, his head being fearfully lacerated and his face badly torn. He died from the effects of his wounds yesterday. Norris' face was torn and his left ankle crushed. It is feared the men sustained serious internal injuries.

The men had just prepared a blast, which failed to explode, and inserted fresh fuse in the hole, when the explosion occurred. Boyle was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital at Lexington, where his wounds were attended. It was found that his eyes were injured, a leg broken, and it was thought that there is concussion of the brain.

The colored men were under the care of local physicians. This makes the sixth death from accidents in handling dynamite by workmen in this county in the past year or so.
